This means that over 5000 young people enjoyed the facilities of the site and they were all supervised by volunteer leaders devoted to the ideals of Scouting and Guiding and determined to provide outdoor adventure in a safe environment to the young people in their care.

All this is only possible because of the commitment and hard work of our Wardens. They ensure the smooth running of the Centre and enable our visitors to get the most out of their visit with their help and advice. This year we welcomed Ted and Diana Cornell and Emily Stone and Dan Easton to our ranks.

Another advantage of the large numbers was that we were able to find the funds to maintain and develop the Centre without having to increase our charges for next year.

It has been a very busy year for maintenance and development. Alistair and Ian completed work on the stainless steel worktops in the kitchen and we also purchased a new fridge.

The purchase of 10 mattresses completed our planned programme for the replacement of mattresses throughout the Centre.

The disabled toilet ceiling was repaired and David painted the walls. New heaters and fans have been installed in the other toilets.

New LED down lighting has been installed in the dormitories, corridor and toilets.

Adaptations were made to the sewage system involving the re-routing of some pipework to avoid blockages which were becoming more frequent due to the problems with the original pipework.

We had serious problems with the water plant which required a new pump and control system. Subsequent to this we had a professional risk assessment of the water system which led to the cleaning and chlorination of the water tank and the implementation of a new system to monitor the operation of the plant.

Outside the perimeter hedge has been cut and we have undertaken repair work to the camp fire circle. A new archery net has been purchased and the quiet area has been given a new lease of life.

We are very pleased with our new dedicated web-site which is interesting, informative and easy to use. Our thanks go to Andrew Everitt for designing the site under Ian's guidance.

Finally I must thank the members of the management committee for their tireless efforts in ensuring the efficient day to day running of the Centre and for their foresight in developing it for the future. Ian Taplin resigned this year and I would like to thank him for his service to the Committee. We welcome Chris King in his place. We are pleased to have been able to recruit someone with such extensive experience of Scouting.

A very big thank you to everyone who contributes in any way to the success of this wonderful Centre.
