On the 29 and 30 March this year, I had the pleasure of performing in the Letchworth and Baldock District Gang Show 2019. The Gang Show is essentially a variety show, but with a noticeably large pantomime vibe that, to my knowledge, is absent from most normal variety shows.

There was a very small cast this year. There were only 24 people in the main cast (compared to over 60 when I started in 2015), although over-18s and ex-cast members who wanted to help with the show did appear onstage occasionally during the opening, finale, and as understudies. In my opinion, this small cast has benefitted the show in some way, as individual talent has been allowed to shine through a lot more. According to the crew during earlier rehearsals, we were one of the loudest casts in a long time, and I have been told by family members that this was the best Gang Show that I have ever performed in.

The multiple musical sections were a big part of the show. Traditionally, each section contains four songs (that are shortened due to time constraints and so that every song gets roughly an equal amount of time being performed) that are connected via some sort of theme or musical style. There were four whole-cast sections, two for the older cast (Scouts, Guides, and Explorers), and two for the younger cast (Cubs and Brownies).

These sections included Sitcoms (the opening section after Make Your Own Kind of Music), Party (one section before the Interval and one after it), and Caribbean/USA (a younger cast section that transitioned into an older cast section).

The sketches were also a big part of the show. The sketches are, for a lot of people, the most fun part of the show, as there is generally a lot more freedom in performing them. These sketches included a Yes-No Game, a misunderstanding about a café's wi-fi password, and a misunderstanding about a newspaper's name (this particular sketch was the favourite of many people I asked). There was also a sketch made specifically for the over-18 crew members, in which they dressed up as flight attendants and sung Flying The Flag (For You), and a rematch of the Yes-No Game written at the very last minute for the oldest main under-18 cast members (myself and the two Explorers) to perform.

I was lucky enough to be chosen for the role of the Master of Ceremonies (MC) for this year's show, a role that only a very small handful of cast members ever get to experience performing, and it was certainly a privilege.

As the MC, I had quite a few necessary interactions with the audience, including the shout-outs, introducing the Interval, and giving the goodbye speech right before the encore. As part of the MC role, I also hosted both of the Yes-No Games, and I even got to perform The Fresh Prince of Bel-Air as a complete solo (and I got a very comfortable throne). But that was not all that I did; I also partook in every whole-cast and older-cast section, as well as having a few solos. The entire experience was fantastic and I had great fun performing in all 3 shows, and I'm sure that everyone else did as well.

A fellow cast member and good friend of mine said that he found it a lot of fun, and that he had made a lot of friends. Another friend of mine, who was working backstage, said that he thought the show was on-par with, if not better than, the recent shows, as he had been watching them since 2012, and he hopes that next year's show lives up to this year's.

Gang Show 2019, like every year, was a fantastic experience, and I doubt that I'll be ending my time in Gang Show any time soon.
