ONE WEEK BEFORE YOUR AGM DATE - SEND BY EMAIL A PDF VERSION OF YOUR AGM REPORTS, with a deadline for any questions and objections to the election of officers. It's suggested you make this deadline the day before your published AGM date.

Back in February, Knights Cubs went to the Sikh Temple to find out about Sikhism. We were given a talk about the 5 Ks which are:

Kesh, which is uncut hair and a beard for men Kanga, a wooden comb for hair Kara (an iron bracelet) Kachera which is big underwear Kirpan that is an iron dagger

They are articles of faith connected to the Sikh ways of life. They provide meals for the public no matter what religion they are. The Sikhs say that if you can't do good do no bad.

After that, we were told about how Sikhism came to be a religion. They were founded by Guru Nanak Dev in the year 1469.

He told us about the Guru Granth Sahib (the Sikhs' holy book) and about the readings in the book. All the readings came from the other 10 Gurus because the last one was dying. We were told they treat the book like a person so they have a bed for it. They get it up in the morning and put in to bed in the evening.

Winston Churchill said that they didn't have to wear motorcycle helmets or any crash helmets because of their turban. This is because in the world wars they didn't wear helmets in the war, so Churchill said why do they need to wear motorcycle helmets.

Recently we renewed our Scout Promise in front of our Leaders. We are doing these meetings via zoom where, if the Leaders want, we can see their screen. That is helpful as they can share information with us quickly. We do these meetings once a week at our normal Scout meeting time and we have enjoyed this so much we have set up another meeting through the week.

Over the past couple of weeks, 2nd Baldock Scouts have been meeting over an app called Zoom to have a virtual Scout meeting. We had a variety of technology- some people used computers, some people used phones and some people used tablets or Ipads.

Around 20 Scouts joined the meeting with the host, our Scout Leaders Ed, John, Graeme, and Zen, starting the Zoom and sending out the ID and password for Scouts to join.

so much to discuss we have added an extra meeting every Tuesday. Once we have all joined, we have a flag break which is a video that a Scout member has created showing the Union Jack flag going up. Then, we look at the entries/pictures Scouts have submitted for different badges. Once we have done that we look at the badges that people have earned at home.

Everything you do for a badge is turned into points. The teams we are in now depends on which patrol we were in - everyone that was in Blue Patrol is now in Gates Team and so on. Every week, these points are added on and the top five Scouts who have 'Kept Calm and Carried on Scouting' are shown upon the screen and applauded. The points everyone in our team has earned that week is then added

up to make an overall team/patrol score. This is a great way to keep scouts actively taking an interest in doing something while having to stay at home! After this, we move onto discussing the badge that we will all be working towards that week. This week, it is the Meteorologist badge. We have created our own weather recording instruments and every day we are all recording the weather from our garden. Each week, we discuss a part of a badge that we will be contributing towards – for the next two weeks, this is the badge

we will be looking at, and everyone is enjoying it so far!

Usually after we have discussed this badge, we all play a quiz (mainly kahoot) together. Not only can this contribute to certain badges, but it also makes Scouts fun, and makes our Scout evenings even more enjoyable! We always play at least one guiz every Scout meeting. After this, there are many options that we do. Sometimes, we do more unrelated Kahoots, We meet every Friday, as before, and have had sometimes we go into breakout rooms - a 'room' where a small group of people talk about things, related or not to Scouts. Other times we carry on discussing badges and we all input on which badges we want to do, and when.

> When doing virtual Scouting, there are many ways for us to be creative. Right now, in our patrols, we are creating a map of 'local' Baldock. One patrol is creating their map through Minecraft, with many meetings in between the main Scout meetings. We then end the evening with another flag break - this time, flag down. This is a great way to keep Scouts busy and active during this confusing period, and we


