COMPETITION TIME AGAIN

THE ICKNIELD SHIELD COMPETITION is to take place on Saturday and Sunday 19 and 20 September. ENTRIES MUST BE IN TO A D C LES COLLINS BY SATURDAY 12 SEPTEMBER, with an entrance fee of half a crown for each team.

Full rules appeared in CO-ORDINA-TOR 51, last August, but as you can't think where you put it, here is a summary of the main points.

Teams of SIX Boy Scouts, under 15 on the Saturday. Teams of five will do. Not more than one PL and one second in a team - or two seconds if there's no PL. Wood fires only. Judging by Scouters or Rovers from outside the District, on: punctuality; site layout; late night inspection; morning inspection; cooking; orLginality; site clearance; incident or emergency. Visitors may come to Saturday evening campfire and Sunday afternoon Scouts' Own, but must not communicate with any team till results are declared.

THE SWIMMING SPORTS for Cubs and Scouts start at 6.15 pm on Monday 7 September at Letchworth Swimming Pool.

CUBS must not be more than 10 years and 6 months old on the day of the competition. <u>Cub events are:</u>

- A. One width breast stroke.
- B. One width back stroke.
- C. One width free style.
- D. Relay of <u>two</u> Cubs, one width each. No Cub may enter for more than two events and the relay.

Scout events are:

UNDER THIRTEEN*:-

- E. 20 yards breast stroke.
- F. 20 yards free style.
- G. 20 yards back stroke.
- H. Diving.
- I. Relay of $\underline{\text{three}}$ Scouts, one width each.

OVER. THIRTEEN*:-

- J. 55 yards breast stroke.
- K. 55 yards free style.
- L. 40 yards back stroke.
- M. Diving.
- N. Relayy of <u>three</u> Scouts, one length each.

*Age limits are defined thus: Under Thirteen means not having reached the thirteenth birthday on the day of the contest; Over Thirteen means having reached the thirteenth but not the fifteenth birthday on the day of the contest. AVE ATQUE VALE

CO-ORDINATOR is supplied free of charge to all warranted Scouters in the District, even if they don't all read it.

No Scout may enter for more than two events and one relay. Within this rule, boys under 13 may enter the Over Thirteen class, but not vice versa.

Scoring is: 3 points for first place, 2 for second and 1 for third. The Swimming Pool Manager is responsible for the running of events and the supplying of timekeepers, and his decision is final.

Over Fifteens: If there is sufficient response from Senior Scouts, additional events will be included in a Senior Section of the programme. Seniors should make their intentions or interest clear to the Swimming Pool Manager (Er Scott) before 6.15 on the day.

FIREFIGHTER BADGE COURSE

As announced in CO-ORDINATOR in February, a course for the (under-15) Firefighter Badge begins at Letchworth Fire Station on Wednesday 30 September at 7.30 pm. Twenty candidates only can be accepted. They must attend the whole course of six Wednesday evenings.
