New Senior Setup in Letchworth

As announced in the local press last Friday, plans for joint meetings of the six Senior Scout troops in Letchworth go into action on Tuesday 5 October. Ashwell and Baldock are not affected, and there is to be no attempt to form a District Troop as in POR 167H.

Some name will be needed for the collective meeting of individual troops, but for this edition of ${\tt CO-ORDI-}$ NATOR we shall refer to it as the Federation. Other suggestions: the Supertroop; Icknield Seniors; Letchworth Senior Squadron (a cavalry term - a squadron being composed of a number of troops); the Howard Squadron; the Union; JOSTLE (Joint Organization of Senior Troops in LEtchworth).

The Federation will have no status as a Group, no scarf or name-tape, and no investitures. Patrol Leaders (S) from the constituent troops will form a Senate, equivalent to a joint Court of Honour, with the ADC(S) and his assistant.

<u>Subscriptibns</u> will remain the concern of individual troops, but for the general finances of the Federation it is intended to form a Liaison Committee of representatives from each of the six Group Committees concerned, under an independent chairman.

Administration of the training and social programme will be by the Scouter team led by ADC(S) Peter Blott (61 Howard Drive). His principal administrative assistant is SA Ken Johnson (80 Spring Road), and special responsibilities for badge work, outdoor activities, public service, visits, competitions, etc., are being shared by 7L SSL Colin Phillips (29 Haselfoot) and 4L SSL Brian Watkins (88 Southfields). Also on the team are all those Rovers and acting SSLs at present concerned with Senior training in Letchworth.

Meetings of the Federation will (generally speaking) be on Tuesday evenings at DHQ, from 7.55 to 10.5 p.m., and detailed programmes for October have already been prepared.

Full co-operation from Letchworth's Senior Scouts at last seems likely, and should make this experiment a success. The County Commissioner is "most interested" $\,$ in the Federation, and is being kept informed of all developments.

WHY-

- are so many of the advance dates given above concerned with the Cub section of the movement?

Most of our readers should know already that 1966 is the Golden Jubilee Year of Cubbing. To quote from the Wolf Cub Annual (mentioned opposite):

"Well actually it began before 1916 but 1916 was the year in which our (and your) Founder, B.-P., first published The Wolf Cub's Handbook, so that is considered the year Wolf Cubs were recognised officially as existing! But from the beginning there had been boys who were 'Wolf Cub age' in the Movement: 'admitted to Troops' (wrote Mr E.E. Reynolds in his history called The Scout Movement) 'because they clamoured to share the fun their elder brothers were having, and sometimes because mother said that Jack could not become a Scout unless little Bobby joined.' But they were too young really to do the things that their elder brothers could do: so it soon became obvious that B.-P. had to think out a name

and a programme for the 'younger brothers.'

"Meanwhile these small boys were being formed into little companies of their own called Junior Scouts, and Beavers and Nippers. B.-P. himself wondered about Colts or Young Scouts or Trappers (a trapper being assistant to a hunter or Scout): but in the end you became Wolf Cubs, like the Wolf Cubs in Mr Kipling's Jungle Books."

So for the fiftieth anniversary of the Junior Scouts, plenty of special events are now being planned. There is to be a National Good Turn (collecting aluminium foil to buy a whole pack of guide dogs for the blind) from July to October. Other events are listed in column 1; and to this can be added Hertfordshire's Cub Jubilee Thanksgiving Service, which is to be held in St Albans Cathedral at 3 pm on Sunday 30 October, Nineteen sixty six. You can't say this is too short notice.

=The Mod Trophy:

No-one seems quite sure of the present situation regarding the Mod Trophy, so here is a brief summary of all available information.

Having won the Trophy on 26 July, in two games to one of skittle billiards, against Scouters of Second Baidock, the Seventh Letchworth Group immediately became the subject of Third Letchworth's.challenge to either winners.

The Third challenge was a quarter-mile swimming crawl by a team of three Boy Scouts. According th the rules, if this was not accepted by 26 August, the Trophy would go to the challengers.

A card from GSM John Gordon to GSM Ken Hart told the Seventh that the Third's SM Mick Murphy had arranged for the Swimming Pool on 24 August at 6 pm. Unfortunately, the Third's team did not get the same message, so when the Seventh turned up there were no challengers!

This has therefore been declared a walkover for the Seventh Letchworth Group, who now hold the Mod Trophy for the fourth time. The rule now applying is that if no challenge is made within three calendar months (that is, before 24 November) the Trophy reverts to the District for a new open contest.

Until that time, any section of any Group in Letchworth & Baldock District may challenge their corresponding section in Seventh Letchworth (Cubs, Boy Scouts, or Senior Scouts - or even an individual patrol or six, or individual Scouters) to any legal competition. The Third can renew their crawl challenge if they like.

Challengers must provide any necessary equipment for both teamsn and arrange any special meeting place. All challenges, with date and place, must be notified to the Press Secretary (80 Spring Road) who will enter them in the official record book.

It's time Ashwell or Weston had a go.
