District cout Shop





Written application should be made now, giving full names, Scout Group, and ages at 28 April 1968, to DIO Ken Johnson (80 Spring Road, Letchworth).


THE MOD TROPHY

SUMMER CAMP QUESTIONNAIRE

Hatfield District last September sent a questionnaire to all Scouts' parents to gain some information on the best methods of planning for summer camps. Thirty per cent replied to the questions that included: "Did your son go to his Troop's summer camp this year?" (34 Yes, 20 No: of these, 11 were because of a clash with the parents' holiday - only 1 because he did not want to go.)

Lessons learnt, according to DC Ken Seaman, appear to be: (1) Date of camp must be fixed early, preferably by the end of December, and parents informed. After the end of March you are far too late. (2) Period of camp does not seem to matter much though the middle of the school holiday gained most votes.
