A subcommittee was appointed and met on 9 July, to consider the offer of financial assistance from Letchworth Garden City Corporation.

NORDJAMB The new District Treasurer, Mr John Moys, reported that £19.31 was in the District's Jamboree account, when the possibility was discussed of sending representatives to the Fourteenth World Jamboree, to be held at Lillehamner in Norway from 29 July to 7 August 1975. The Troop Scouters' Council was asked to estimate the numbers likely to want to go.

No HSN/HG is being issued this month, so we are dispensing with the usual envelopes. This space is for your address.

SCOUT SHOP REPORT, 1972

(This report should have been included in the business of the District Annual General Meeting)

ONCE again we are able to report an increase in sales (£3,080 against £2,900 last year) in spite of the predicted loss of business from Biggleswade and Luton.

We have paid our outstanding debt of £84 to the Letchworth Guides and are putting out £66 to the Scout groups of the area, plus £25 to outside groups. The Executive Committee is to receive £71, and the Letchworth and Baldock Guides' sum (including Local Associations) this year is £86.

There is a good stock of uniforms, and cash in the bank at 31 December 1972 was f187.

In 25 shop hours during the year we have sold £1,060 worth of uniforms and camping equipment, so I think we can rightly say we are fulfilling a need greater than we saw just five years ago when we started. Incidentally, it may surprise many that in those five years we have saved our local units approximately £1,300, without taking into account any postage or expenses.

I would like to thank on your behalf the Ladies who so cheerfully serve in the shop. We would welcome two more to help, one Tuesday, one Friday on alternate

Now there is a question from me before I offer to answer any questions from the District: "When I resign at the beginning of August who takes my place?" It seems to me that this idea is too valuable to give up lightly, and I would recommend, although it is difficult to split the work, that a team of at least two people might try to run it so that one person is not tied up too much.

Following my appeal for hospitality for our French visitors in last month's CO-ORDINATOR, I would very much like to thank all those Scouting families who responded so kindly. The generous welcome given to the Eclaireurs was really appreciated, coming as it did from all parts of Letchworth. In alphabetical order, let me thank Mr & Mrs Birch, Bridle, Brunswick, Deary, Eaves, Faden, Green, Hawkins, Hoyle, Petty, Plum, Ritchie, Templeman, Wall, Williams and Wood - and also Colin and Eileen Phillips for receiving and delivering to his compatriots Philippe Mordant, who arrived four days late owing to exams!

It was heartening to realize that every Scout group in Letchworth was involved in the welcome to the Eclaireurs. Venture Scouts and Rangers also helped, especially at the memorable bandstand singsong on 13 July.

Apart from the Fourth, who were going to France themselves, every Letchworth group was represented in the camp at Well End from 14 to 21 July and Coetmor Mill in the following week.

Everybody worked together as a more or less united mob, and though the usual amount of shouting and slavedriving had to be done at times, in both languages, nobody seemed to mind very much.

From Well End, visits were made to London on two occasions, to include sight-seeing and shopping and a performance of the Royal Tournament. Tribute must be paid to the tolerant understanding of the Warden of Well End, Mr Ron Scott, who had not had anything quite like our mixture before. Invaluable help was also given by the Uther Pendragon & Verulan service team, and by Fourth Harpenden who came to pack tents for us after our early morning departure for Coetmor Mill.

To Dave Ellis, of High Wych Scout Group, an old friend of Letchworth & Baldock District, I am most deeply indebted for help in so many ways during our week at the Mill. He led the first exploratory hillwalking on the Sunday, and patiently convinced the Eclaireurs of the need for different kinds of precautions when crossing the Carnedds later in the week.

Expeditions in various directions took French and British to Llyn Ogwen, Llanfair-fechan, Llanfairpwllgwyngyllgogerychwyrn-drobwllllantysiliogogogoch, and the Lavan Sands, where vast quantities of crabs and mussels were caught, and cooked, and eaten with great relish. Nobody was ill at all, apart from a couple of sore throats earlier in the week, and one or two bashed toes.

Despite obvious misunderstandings, we all agreed (Dave Ellis, Guy Almairac, Laurent Cayla, Philippe Mordant, Bruno Wiedemann, Germain Labie and myself) that boys of any nationality are basically exactly the same. We think they all enjoyed it, and we all feel sure that this international effort was well worth while.
