### EXTENSION CAMP

I travelled with the advance party on the outward journey, by road and sea. We were heading for the camp site at Gilwell Ada's Hoeve in Ommen, Holland, via Dover and Ostend, right through Belgium and most of Holland.

We arrived at A.H. after a very tiring but interesting journey, and we were welcozed by Mr and Mrs Budda, the camp warden and his wife, and Marty, their assistant. It was already dark so there wasn't much we could do that night, but the next morning there was plenty to do. All the tents had to be erected. These were 180 pounders kindly supplied by the Royal Corps of Transport stationed at Dulmen in West Germany. Some of the soldiers' sons who are Scouts in Germany also camped with us.

That evening we all got changed into uniform to welcome the Scouts with a handicap, who had travelled by air to Amsterdam and then by coach to Ommen. We were all very tired by this time and after a very good meal we retired early to bed.

The following days consisted mainly of test work, walks into Ommen, and general camp fun. We went swimming twice and the pools were brilliant. One evening we had the pool completely to ourselves. We were also allowed in the river, which ran alongside the camp site. On Friday, the young helpers had the afternoon off and some of us decided to build a raft. This plan was foiled by some staff who decided to take our oil drums!

But now to Thursday. This was our day out. Having stowed the wheelchairs in the boot of the coach we set off for Amsterdam. Once there, we were taken for a long trip on some of the 80 or more canals, passing various barges, one of which is supposed to have more than 100 cats on board. This trip was supplied free of charge by the boat firm. We then went for a meal in one of Amsterdam's famous restaurants, "The Dorious". After a scrumptious meal we were left to go where we wanted to, with our partners, for the afternoon. There were several interesting places to explore, e.g. the Palace and the Monument. We had a picnic tea at "The Dam" and then returned to camp.

Another action packed day was Saturday. This was our Open Day. The visitors arrived at 2 pm but we had been making preparations all the morning. There were about 300 visitors. They all went round to various patrols, about 38 to each. Then came the "Mini Olympics". This consisted of games for anyone and everyone, and was hilarious. After this, most of the visitors had to leave, but some stayed on for a camp fire, at which all the acknowledgements were made.

Sunday was our last whole day in camp. The morning was taken up condensing the camp into three patrols instead of six. Then came our last chance to see Ommen. When we

got back we had a quick tea and then a short closing ceremony, and we all had an early night. Most of the tents had already been taken down, so those who were able slept outside under the stars.\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

Monday dawned bright and sunny: we had been lucky with the weather all the week. Now it was time to go home. This time I was going by plane. After a very bumpy flight we arrived in Heathrow, and then by various minibuses and ambulances to our separate homes, glad to be home but sad at having to pert with our newly made friends.

During this camp I was absolutely amazed at the capabilities of these boys. They did things I would never have thought possible. At our camp disco some even made their wheelchairs dance. They were great, and I'm looking forward immensely to going with them again next year, somewhere in England.
