4. GRANTS FOR WOOD BADGE TRAINING

(Extract from letter from Colin McIntyre - County Secretary)

It has at last been confirmed that GRIST Funding is available for all Scout, Venture Scout, Commissioner/GSL and tutor training up to 31st March 1989.

Training for Beaver and Cub Scout Leaders is not covered by this scheme, and it was understood from the outset that support would come from Divisional Youth and Community Committees for this range of Leader training.

These Committees which although funded by the County Council act independently. They have now, I understand, decided, because they have insufficient funds available, that they will no longer support training for those outside the Youth age range.

However, since some of our training is GRISTED Groups and Districts might consider redirecting their funds to provide a greater means of support for Beaver and Cub Leader Training.

7. DISTRICT ADMINISTRATORS' EVENING

Thank you for attending this evening which allowed Group Executive Committee members to meet members of the District Executive, District Team and Scout Fellowship. I think it is essential for all sides to meet one another to discuss matters of common interest and improve communications.

Topics discussed included:-

a. Supplementary Personal Accident Insurance - the increased cost of the insurance has made it impossible for the District to finance it any longer but Groups were asked to consider covering their own leaders.

A further letter concerning cover for supporters will be considered at the next District Executive.

- b. Property Insurance Groups were reminded of the importance of this insurance. All present had adequate cover.
- c. Fire Risk the importance of proper fire precautions was stressed.
- d. Covenants 12th Letchworth have received £3000 in five years from the tax man because parents covenant group subscriptions. If any other Group is interested Mike Thomason would be pleased to explain how the system works.
- e. Annual Census new arrangements for this year were explained whereby census data will be taken on 31st December 1988 and the membership subscription will be payable by 1st April 1989.
- f. Finance of Training see Grants for Wood Badge Training.
- g. Members were reminded that all funds must pass through Group accounts and that, under no circumstances should leaders use their own accounts.
- h. An appeal was made for helpers at the Scout Shop.

8. COUNTY CAMPING SURVEY

(Trefor Salter - ACC Scouts)

1988

- 646 boys are due to go to a camp of 5 nights or more
 - 37 troops plan a camp of 5 nights or more
- 36 camps of 3 or 4 nights are planned
- 180 camps of 1 or 2 nights are planned

Average camper nights per boy = 6.35

The evidence is that we are following the national trend of a reduction in the week/10 day summer camp but an increase of long week-end camps.

The $6\frac{1}{2}$ nights per boy is certainly a sad reflection of the quite recent past, when boys would easily average something in the region of 11 - 15 nights each year.
