GANG SHOW 1991

When commissioned by the District Commissioner to write a piece about the Gang Show, I had to agree, if only to save Bob a job. I think he wants an objective criticism from an outsider's point of view, so I will try - but it is hard to be unbiased when one's own Gang Show neckerchief is dated 1957 and full of memories that can't be washed out.

After last year's Brave Try following the fire disaster, I went to the 1991 show on the Saturday night, hoping to find that things were back to normal. And they were.

Let's have the bad news first. Almost all the Gang Shows I've seen (including London ones produced by Ralph Reader himself) have had the occasional sketch that creaked enough to make you cringe. This year's nominations in this category are "Rural England" and "The Night Before", both agonizingly slow and unfunny. This is not so much a criticism of the performers as of the dreadful material.

Moving up the scale, the opening number was not quite as encouraging as it might have been. We could hear all the words (bravo') but by the last night of the show I expected a little more oomph from everybody. A bit of this would also have helped in "Seasons", which was a great idea but too slow and oomphless until the winter arrived!

That beautifully painted woodland scene was well worth seeing three or four times, and I look forward to meeting it again next year - with others. My congratulations go to the "Fairies at the Bottom of Your Garden", who proved that girls are just as good as boys in this kind of soppy thing, although my ancient memory suggests that boys used to be much funnier dressed in frillies. Times do change.

And yet some unalterable truths remain: one being that Cubs steal scenes. "Wild West" reaffirmed this. The small chap in the huge sombrero made the whole effort of coming out on a wet evening thoroughly worth while, and the tallest one (Dan the thingummy man) had the sparkle of star quality in his eye. Keep them in the cast, Mr Producer, and don't let them ever back out.

This brings us to the noticeably weak representation of older Scouts, Venture Scouts and Rangers. If only a few more of these can persuade themselves to join in the fun in future, a lot of that oomph will be back in the right places. It was certainly there in "Circus" - quite the best item in the show, with everything happening at once in all directions, excellent costumes, lots of colour, movement and speed. Was that only a piano accompaniment? I got the illusion of an entire circus band! It really oomphed:

How could they follow that? Well, the Beaver Scout Leaders did it, in their beautiful "Beaver Meeting" duo with a nice resemblance to a Joyce Grenfell style. It was fresh and funny, just the right length, and of course right up to date!

"Clippie Marlene" (who should have been Marleen to rhyme with Stotfold Green) was incredibly out of date, despite the neat substitution of Hoppanstoppers in the revised lyric. Bus conductresses are probably an extinct species, so one hopes this thirty year old parody will now be stuffed in a museum. And yet we had that wonderful "Jamboree" songs thirty four years old, lively and appropriate again for the Cub Scouts' seventy fifth anniversary. This was very well done, wrapped around "The Morning of Your Life" by that ancient Scouter who has actually been in every Letchworth & Baldock Gang Show since 1955. There's stickability for you!

We can't do without these old folk - the ones who might still remember what "Free and Frippence 'Apenny" means, but who gave such oomph to its new inflated translation as "Fifty Pence in Coppers".

Thank you, Gang! You've been making memories all right. Please go on doing so for a long, long, long time.
