
AN OLD FOGEY AT THE GANG SHOW

That was a clever beginning. A silent group in silhouette - the audience wondering what was going to happen - and the sudden topical surprise of the whole Gang with noses to match their neckerchiefs! That was good.

There were some quite sublime moments in this year's show, perhaps the greatest being the sheer uninhibited cheek of Cinderella's three sisters. Finding big he-man Scouts prepared to carry on like that is the real basic stuff of the peculiarly British show business tradition shared by Gang Show, Music Hall and Pantomime - and we peculiar British audiences love it. So it was a great idea to devote nearly half the show to an original pantomime, and especially such a shameless spoof Oh, yes, it was! But it must be said that even on Saturday night we missed an awful lot of Mike Miles's words because almost all the performers were in too much of a hurry to let us hear the rhyming couplets. That was a pity.

By contrast, in the middle of that marvellously colourful "Animal Fair", the two Doctor Doolittles gave us such perfect clarity, showing such confidence in what they were doing. Though there are no "stars" in a Gang Show, I looked out for these two in the later choruses, and they were noticeable, seeming to know instinctively how to move to the music. It's a natural skill, but the other la.ds and lasses still have time to acquire it.

Some of them also looked very worried during the "Aspects of Love", and being a traditionalist old fogey I wondered if this was because the music of Lord Lloyd Webber and suchlike is a bit too difficult to perform. Although the "Starlight Express" number with everyone on skates was a breathtaking success, it was still the good old tunes that really roused everyone in the cast - and the audience - from dear old "Nellie the Elephant" all the way to the Saints marching in. And after that, the transformation to Scout and Guide Uniforms was almost magical, leading to the joyfully loud climax of "Memories" and "Crest of a Wave"! But one or two choruses of each should have been enough. Ralph Reader wrote many other lively singable things, ideal for giving confidence to any nervous youngster, so perhaps next year, might we have just a touch more of the old magician?



Were You There?

Last night saw the final production of "Gang Show '97", and every member of the crew must agree that this show contained an enormous amount of very special magic which makes being involved in these productions such a joy. Old hands will recognise it, while newcomers cannot fail to appreciate it. From the earliest faltering, stumbling rehearsals - sometimes perfect, more often, chaotic - to that critical dress rehearsal when you finally convince yourself it will all go horribly wrong on the night, that magic is ever-present.

Friendship and laughter are its vital elements, and during the making of "Gang Show '97", we indulged ourselves very well indeed!


