## TROOP LEAD ERSHIP COURSE






Our thanks go to all leaders and their helpers who made the weekend so successful and to Roy Nicholson and his crew at Weston who made us so welcome.



#### **BEAVER SUMMER ACTIVITIES**



## **EMPLOYER'S LIABILITY**

During a recent series of workshops on Health and Safety issues, the question was repeatedly raised regarding the relevance or applicability of statutory Employer Liability Insurance. It is clear that this is an area which is widely misunderstood.

Any Scout/Group/County which directly employs a person is required, by law, to arrange Employer's Liability Insurance. This applies irrespective of whether or not a formal contract of employment exists. It can include employment without direct monetary remuneration (eg. a warden who receives free accommodation).


There is no hard and fast rule. However, if it can reasonably be argued that an individual is undertaking a task for a benefit, then an employment situation will almost certainly exist and the Employer will need to arrange insurance. This applies even to an employment situation where a parent spends two hours a week cleaning the Group headquarters and gets paid a few pounds for the work.

If you believe that you may have an employer/employee relationship, contact Scout Insurance Services at Lancing or the Personnel Manager at Baden-Powell House for advice.

In 1979, the Cub Scout Pack had been transplanted to its own Headquarters presented by Gavin Jones Nurseries, and on its firm roots had grown a strong Scout Troop and, most remarkably, its very own Venture Scout Unit already well established for eleven years. Not many Groups can equal that standard and Anne Lilley was rightly proud of the seed she planted as the first Cub Scout Leader two decades ago.

There was a tinge of regret that the Eleventh had not bloomed in as many colours as had been hoped for, but "like all groups, we've had our ups and downs. And there are some older lads at the back who have been in since we started and have come through from Cubs to Leaders." And when she had cut the ceremonial birth-day cake, one of those first Cubs presented his Akela with a symbolic potted plant to remember this grand occasion - as if she would ever forget it. 


DISTRICT BBQ RAISES £350 FOR WORLD JAMBOREE


