#### Colin Phillips 1929-1998

Colin devoted 56 years of his life to Scouting.

The Scout Promise and Law were the sure foundation upon which Colin based his life.

It is the commitment and enthusiasm of people like Colin which has maintained steadfast the core values of Scouting at a time when the Movement has had to adapt to the changing values of our time.

Colin was invested as a Scout in 1942 when he joined the 3rd Letchworth Scout Troop. At the time it was combined with the 1st and 6th Letchworth Groups and meeting at the British Legion Hall and the Military was using our HQ in Icknield Way. He gained his King's Scout Award in 1946 and was proud to attend the St George's Day Parade at Windsor when the salute was taken by King George VI and Queen Elizabeth and their daughters Elizabeth and Margaret.

National Service interrupted his Scouting for two years but he returned to be Scout Leader at the 7th Letchworth and eventually he moved to the Venture Scout Section where he helped form Champion Hills VSU.

He was able to pass on his skills when he was invited to join the County Leader Training Team and he had the privilege of tutoring at Gilwell Park - our National HQ

His name became associated with our District Arts and Crafts Competition, the It's a Knock Out competition which he developed and ran so successfully and his work at the Norton Bury Scout and Guide Activity Centre.

Colin was an energetic person who loved outdoor physical activities and many generations have enjoyed camping, hiking, climbing and pioneering under his leadership.

He asked nothing in return but the satisfaction of seeing a shy Scout become an active patrol leader or the look of triumph on the face of a Scout who has just completed, near to the limits of physical endurance a long hike, difficult climb or camp in atrocious weather conditions.

He was content in the knowledge that he was helping young people develop their physical, mental and spiritual awareness.

The Scout Association recognised his contributions by awarding him a Long service Decoration, the Medal of Merit and the Silver Acorn.


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## The Lister Hospital Stroke Fund


Finally I am pleased to record that Fred Cogar is making a recovery form his Heart Attack and that Denis Whelan and Ken Johnson are feeling much better.



After the meeting there were refreshments and then a most interesting and informative talk was given by George Duncalf

of Raptor Rescue. He told us of the dangers faced by birds of prey birds and how his voluntary organisation came to their rescue. and cared for them until they could be returned to the wild. They were successful in over fifty per cent of their cases.

The highlight of the evening was the display of three beautiful birds - a little owl, a barn owl and a European Eagle Owl. George warned is that in spite of the attraction of these birds they do not make good pets as they do not relate to humans in the same way as domestic animals. He urged us to enjoy them in the wild and not keep them as pets.



#### TROOP EXPERIENCE

Troop experience covers all the activities that Scouts do whilst they are with the Troop on evenings and weekends. This covers the majority of the time that a Scout is with the Scout Section and this part of Plan 2001 is about helping to improve the quality of the Troop experience and therefore the quantity of Scouts. Results from research for the Programme Review Group show weekend camps as the most popular activity and that nearly 80% of adults class camping as very important for the Section. We are looking at trying to find ways of making it easier for you to do all this with your Scouts. Later in there will also be ideas on hoe to make camp planning easier. The Scout Section wants many more Scouts to take part in camps. To help with this it will be sharing ideas from some really great District and County/Area camps around the country and making this information available so that your District, County or Area can copy these.


The last part of the tour took us down to the large walk through tank with the larger fish and sharks in it. Then into the shop so that the Cubs,

#### NIGHTJAR '98


Gales, high winds and driving rain led travel organisations to worn travellers do not set out unless their journey was really necessary.

## Keep Control

One of the most frequently asked questions on training courses concerns how to maintain discipline in the Colony, Pack or Troop. It takes a little work and effort to set up some ground rules but is well worth the effort in the long term.

This is not intended to be a definitive guide but simply advice on what does work for many Leaders. Sanctions or deprivation seem to be worthwhile methods to employ. We must assume that youngsters join Scouting because they like what they can do in Scouting. If misbehaviour stops them doing what they like, the message can, quickly, get through. The secret is not to do it too frequently or they can become disenchanted with Scouting and, more to the point, with you!

Barring youngsters from a favourite activity is effective and they should modify their behaviour to prevent a reoccurrence.

One favourite method to get silence is for the Leader to raise his or her hand in the air and when the youngsters see this, they, too, must become silent and raise their hand. This has a cumulative effect as youngsters note others raising their hand, catch on, and follow the action. Leaders must not do anything until all hands are raised and silence reigns. This is a subtle form of deprivation which affords the Leader a chance to point out that the youngsters are wasting their time, not the Leader's time as the Leader is there anyway. It will only take two or three occasions for the message to get through and, often the other youngsters will make sure those who are carrying on stop and raise their hands.

Another Method is to speak in a normal conversational way so that the youngsters have to be quiet and listen properly to hear. If they make a noise, they won't hear. It's as simple as that and will take a couple of occasions to get the message over to them. Don't be tempted to repeat what you've said as that will defeat the purpose. If they're not quiet enough to hear what you say ... it's their loss!

There is a great advantage in having an inter-Six or inter-Patrol competition running continuously through each Meeting as loss of points for misbehaviour or creating in games can have a very salutary effect, especially if it affects a long term competition for the Lodge, Six or Patrol over a year or term.

Sending youngsters out of the room or out of the action is another option which can have mixed results as, often, they misbehave and distract the others whilst the exclusion lasts.

Shouting or blowing a whistle can be counterproductive and very wearing on a Leader. It is far better to have silent control by the hand-raising method or to speak in a normal voice and let the youngsters realise that they have to be quiet and pay attention if they want to hear instructions or an announcement.


Your greatest weapon is that the youngsters come to you do to things that they like because they want to do

them and they lose out if they are not able to do them because of misbehaviour or lack of discipline. You don't want to alienate the, you simply want control so that they can play their games or do their thing and do it all safely and most effectively.

Keeping discipline is not as difficult as it seems to some. One thing is to ensure that all Leaders adopt the same course of action - a united front - don't argue among themselves in front of the youngsters and don't put themselves in a position where one Leader can be played off against another.

Above all, keep control at all times as it will be your benefit as well as to the benefit of your youngsters and the quality of Scouting that you provide.




