





#### DISTRICT TRAINING "SWOPSHOP"

Over twenty leaders attended the training "Swopshop" and took part in some lively discussions about the way we conduct our Scouting.

The morning started with a session on 'Ceremonies' led by Nick Farmer. It illustrated the culture of our Scouting and the ceremonies we use to emphasize our values. There were many interesting variations between troops and many ideas were exchanged. All agreed that ceremonies are an important part of moving from one section to another and that they are most effective when leaders work as a team and the youngsters are carefully prepared for the move through a programme of integrated activities.

We also discussed the requirement of a new leader and how we could best give them support. The value of Personal Training Adviser was emphasized together with working alongside an experienced leader.

In the afternoon we discussed the programme review "Visions for the Future" and the problem of retaining older Scouts. A lot of the discussion centred on the uniform which we now understand is being looked at by a separate focus group.

Whilst all this was going on Phil May conducted a 'First Response' course for eight leaders and John Chapman was able to take two new leaders through the Phase I & Phase II training.

Thanks to everyone who contributed to the success of the day and to Anne and Gwen for an appetizing midday meal.

# Adolescent/Co-education Workshops for District Commissioners and Group Scout Leaders

Many District Commissioners and Group Scout Leaders have suggested that they would value some help to think through the development of Adolescent and Co-educational Scouting - both are areas that many find difficult to plan for and work with.

To meet that need a series of workshops for District Commissioners and Group Scout Leaders has been set up. The workshops will provide an opportunity for DCs and GLSs to look at issues and concerns relating to teenagers in Scouting and the issues relating to co-educational Scouting (all ages).

The nearest venue is London (Gilwell Park) on Sunday 12th March 2000.

The cost of the workshop will be £5.00 per person which will cover the cost of refreshments and the use of the premises. There will be no lunch provided therefore, it is recommended that those attending provide their own packed lunch.

#### A CENTURY OF SCOUTING: Part 1

Becoming aware that in seven years' time the Scout movement will be 100 years old Letchworth & Baldock District Scout Fellowship has formed a subcommittee to gather as much stuff as it can, with the idea of publishing the history of this District in time for the centenary.

Several people with long memories have already given or lent photographs, note books, minute books and so on, but there is always room for more. Meantime, Rita has suggested that we might take a gallop through the twentieth century, just before it finishes, and look at some of the odd bits of information that might be included in the Official History of Letchworth & Baldock District.

Actually, the District only began in May 1944 when the District Boy Scouts Association was formed. Before that, Letchworth had been part of Hitchin District and Baldock came under the wing of Royston's D.C.

We all know (don't we?) that Mafeking was relieved on 17 May 1900, and Robert Stephenson Smyth Baden-Powell (B.-P.to most people) became a popular hero in this country. His army manual "Aids to Scouting" was read by all sorts of folk who had no intention of personally going out to the Karroo, or the Veldt, or wherever, and tracking down potential enemies of the Queen. But it looked like a good game, and when William Smith, the founder of the Boys' Brigade, suggested that Scouting would be an interesting activity for some of his lads, B.-P. was persuaded to hold an experimental camp for a selected cross-section of boys, in August 1907 on an island in Poole Harbour called Brownsea. In the months that followed, he began work on a boys' version of his book.

It was called "Scouting for Boys. A Handbook for Instruction in Good Citizenship" and was first published in fortnightly parts costing four pence each, starting on 22 January 1908. Then, on 18 April came the first number of a weekly paper, "The Scout" costing one penny.

In this B.-P. wrote: "I am glad to see that, although the Boy Scouts have only been set going within the last two months, they are rapidly increasing all over the country, and we have even had letters from Burma, Gibraltar and Canada, asking for particulars, with a view to starting colonial branches".

There were no Districts, and no national Headquarters. Scouting was simply an activity for the Boys' Brigade or any other boys' club, or any gang of lads who read the book and decided to form a patrol. There was no exact uniform, but a wide brimmed hat, a shirt and short trousers or breeches were the general idea. And very odd they looked in those respectable Edwardian times, and they got laughed at; but still more and more Boy Scouts appeared all over the place, and good citizens saw that it was worth encouraging these lads in training for Good Citizenship.

In a very new town called Letchworth Garden City, where quite a lot of people dressed in unusual ways and were laughed at, Mr Norman D Saunders, of Elmhurst in Baldock Road, was persuaded to become the first Scoutmaster to the three local Patrols working together as a Troop. We have a set of photographs presented at Christmas 1909 "To Mr & Mrs Browning & Family as an appreciation of their many kindnesses to the Letchworth Troop of Boy Scouts during their camp at Half Hyde Farm".

Half Hyde Farm was near Shephall, where today the Sainsbury Superstore stands on the corner of Magpie Crescent, Stevenage. The photographs show the Letchworth Boy Scouts enjoying their camp dinner outside a bell tent in a farm field, and one caption reads: "My! How we did live!"

Almost every village in the District had its own spontaneous Patrol of Boy Scouts, though few of them lasted long enough to became established Troops. The twelfth-century new town of Baldock made a good start and has kept going. Eric Woodward (though contrary to rumour, not actually there himself) has found a news item in the "Hertfordshire Express" of September 1909, reporting that "Whitwell B.P. Boy Scouts were joined by a small contingent of Baldock B.P. Scouts for a Weekend Camp", and there must have been many more such events not recorded. Each week, "The Scout" had the latest news of new Troops, such as the one being raised at Welwyn by Arthur Davies in December 1908, where the Cuckoo and Peewit Patrols used the old drill hall as a club room. The first list of Local and District Committees was in April 1909, including C.C.M. Kennedy as the Stevenage secretary.

On 11 December 1909, "The Scout" reported "The Letchworth Troop spent a most interesting evening at Howard Hall recently. All the patrols turned up, together with some recently joined tenderfeet. The chairman of the local committee, Mr N Macfadyen, gave a very interesting lecture, illustrated by lantern slides, of the local troop in camp. The Scouts then appeared on the platform, and for an hour or so showed the audience the value of the training they had received. At the close ten Scouts, led by Mr L.R. Wheeler, their Scoutmaster, saluted the Union Jack, and 'God save the King' was sung. The hall was quite full, and the evening, although little time could be given to rehearsal, passed off most successfully, while the troop funds will receive a much-needed leg-up. Great credit is due to Assistant Scoutmaster Saunders for preparing and showing the slides of Scout life. Cheers were given at the close for the Scouts."

It was in fact Doctor Norman Macfadyen who presided at that meeting, and later organized an adult committee for the Letchworth Scouts. Its chairman was Edmund Hunter, the owner of the silk weaving works at the corner of Ridge Road and Pixmore Avenue (and the building is still there).

By 1911, Norman Saunders had taken over as Scoutmaster, and one of the Patrol Leaders, Bill Rayment, became Assistant Scoutmaster. It was a busy summer, for the Scouts were chosen to carry the flags of the Colonies in Letchworth's procession to celebrate the coronation of King George V; next week they marched to Ickleford for a rehearsal for the Royal Review and three days later joined a special train at 2.20 am taking them to Windsor to parade before the King. Two more uniform parades in the same week followed, with a march to Hitchin for a hospital demonstration. Then came a field day and overnight camp with the Ashwell Troop, a week's camp with Knebworth Scouts in Knebworth Park in August, and a week's camp at the Cloisters in September. And at the end of the month, the Peewit patrol from the Norton Road School troop, and some of the Town troop, cycled to Watford for a County rally and camp.

It began to look as though Scouting in this District was here for good.

Any one wishing to make an enquiry regarding the booking of the house and use of the camp site should get in touch with her.


