


KENNETH ROY HART

18th October 1921 - 11th January 2000




Trusty, loyal, helpful, brotherly, courteous, kind, obedient, cheerful, thrifty, clean as the threshing wind.

Ken Hart lived out these principles even though he had not been a Scout as a boy. Having helped out at his elder son Kevin's first Cub camp in 1959 and later prompted (Head-hunted) by the then District Commissioner, Les Brown, Ken became involved with 7th Letchworth as a leader. In May 1961 he received his warrant as a GSM and five years later was appointed ADC (General Duties). Ken also served periods as ADC (Cubs), ADC (Scouts) and ADC (Development). He was a tireless worker for the boys, the group, the District and the Movement as a whole and his achievements were many and diverse. That closest to his heart was the establishment of the Norton Bury Scout and Guide Activity Centre, of which he was the prime instigator around 1967 and which was opened in 1979. Although he gave up as a warden about a year ago he continued to look in whenever he was that way.

He received a well deserved Medal of Merit for outstanding services in 1976 and the Silver Acorn in 1980.

Ken was most happy working with the boys and thoroughly enjoyed camping with groups or district, especially those tranquil moments at the end of the day when, with the Scouts in their tents, the Leaders sat round the campfire embers with cocoa and "chocky bickies".

How many Sections in your Scout Group, how many young people in each Section, how many adults in each section, what kind of programme do you run - mainly indoor / a lot of outdoor / number of camps / join in District and County events / fun based etc.

2. Identify where people within the Scout Group and the Scout District want to be in one, two, or three years.

One way of helping you to answer this questions is to ask yourself "What makes good Scouting?"

3. Identify ways of getting there (The Plan).

The plan is yours, implemented by you, monitored by you, owned by you. However I can help you through the above process and the County Team / District Team is there to help you get from where you are now to where you want to be in one, two or three years times.

Please share your plan with me. I am a strong believer in sharing good practise across the County especially those "ways of getting there".



A CENTURY OF SCOUTING :PART 2

Weston was one of the earliest local villages to form a Troop of Boy Scouts. By 1910, Cedric Willway, son of the Vicar of Weston, had become their Scoutmaster, for winter meetings in the school and summer evening exercises in and around the Vicarage meadow. The boys paid a penny a week for subscription, but the Vicar himself gave money to help with the cost of uniforms.

Official Scout hats (with adjustable chin straps) could be ordered by post from official outfitters for 1s. 3d. plus 2d postage. Uniform scarves, 31 inches square, were sixpence each and a boy's entire uniform added up to about eight shillings, or 40 pence in present currency. The Weston lads were noted for their smart turnout at church parades with their own bugle band, and were keen to meet other local troops for football matches, in spite of some poor results. Walsworth Scouts once beat them 6-0, and First Baldock had one record victory of 21 goals to nil.

Unfortunately in 1912 the troop was discontinued when Cedric Willway left the village, and it was not re-formed until after the First World War.

Ashwell's original troop was more fortunate. We have photographs of a camp in Dixies Meadow in 1911 and there are records of Mr Goble as Scoutmaster in the following year, succeeded by Mr H P Pack by 1917: a famous name in the village! Patrol Second Lawrence Pack, of Ashwell's Cuckoo Patrol, gained a mention in "The Scout" in November 1911 for saving a little child from being killed by a speeding motor-car. "The Scout was prepared. He rushed forward, caught the child in his arms, and bore it into safety, just managing to escape the car by a few inches only."

Baldock Boy Scouts were becoming organized as "The Citizen" mentions the formation of the troop and a Local Association in 1913. Early next year, the Urban District Council "on the motion of Mr Page, seconded by Mr Hall, agreed to lend the Town Hall free of charge to the Baldock Boy Scouts Association for a lantern lecture on 23 April". The word spread, the Scouts gained strength, and in July they enjoyed a weekend camp at Willian under Scoutmaster F. Cockburn. The Secretary, Dr G.B. Mason, is on record as Scoutmaster in 1915, when First Baldock was registered with national headquarters. Half a century later, A.G. Crouch, treasurer of a Scout group at Morden in south London, remembered his Scouting days in Baldock: "Mr Page, well known in those days for his Maltings, was our benefactor. He allowed us to pitch our bell tents on his farm and he also supplied us with free milk and eggs. Another camp we used to run was at Clothall, up the top of Barley Mow Lane".

Easter Monday in 1916, though remembered in history for the Republican rising in Dublin, was also the occasion for a field day shared by Scouts from Weston, Barley, Royston and Letchworth, followed by a parade led by First Baldock's drum and bugle band.

The name of Norman Saunders is found in many early records of Letchworth's Scouts. In October 1911 "The Citizen" reported that he had resigned as Scoutmaster of the Second Letchworth Troop after four years. Twenty youths aged 11 to 15 were resolved to hold together under ASM William Rayment, meeting weekly on Tuesday evenings at the Boys' Club (the building now containing Morrisons' restaurant!) In August 1912, however, Norman Sanders led a group of Letchworth Scouts on a successful boating holiday from Cambridge to Ely and Upward. Two years later, the Great War began; Captain Sanders was called to different service, and did not return. You can read his name on the war memorial in Station Place.

Many people had felt that war was coming and a few didn't approve of what they thought were the "military ideas" of Baden-Powell's Boy Scouts. In June 1913, a company of "Boys' Life Brigade Scouts" was formed and recognized as the Third Letchworth Troop, to be run on more pacifist principles. Yet in that August of 1913, sixteen boys had saved one pound each for the international camp at Ghent in Belgium, where they met and made friends with Belgian, French and German Scouts. Mr Reg March had been the troop's secretary but had taken on the leadership, with a former Patrol Leader, R.B. McGrew, returning as ASM in June.

After the Belgian camp, Reg March kept in touch with friends made there, and in particular with a young Belgian Scout name Jean-Pierre Kies. When the Kaiser's army invaded Belgium in 1914, Reg waited for days at Victoria station to meet Jean-Pierre among the crowds of refugees arriving. He brought him to Letchworth, where there was a large Belgian community throughout the war. Among those who stayed on, Jean-Pierre Kies qualified as a doctor and lived the rest of his life in Letchworth.

When the war broke out, Percy Everett, who had helped B.-P. in the running of the Brownsea Island experiment and was appointed County Commissioner for Hertfordshire in 1908 wrote to all the newspapers in the county promising that "1,000 of our Scouts shall be at the disposal of the Chief Constable" for any sort of service at home. A "Scouts' War Book" was published, costing a penny, with advice in "Helping the Empire in War Time", "What to do when raids occur", "How to treat Bullet and Bomb Wounds" and "Fire Fighting". Fortunately this district avoided the need for such heroic deeds, but Boy Scouts were proved to be useful. Very few people had telephones in 1914, so the Letchworth troop acted as messengers to summon a meeting for Special Constables at the Estate Office. A Scout also called at the Police Station three times a day to ask the Inspector for any orders, and the keen lads proved of assistance in taking dispatches to Hitchin and elsewhere. Best of all, they helped to guard the reservoir in the Weston Hills day and night against possible spies and saboteurs.

On his way to reservoir duty one morning, a Letchworth Scout found a purse containing seven shillings in cash. Returning after his shift, he saw a notice outside a house offering a reward for the purse and contents, so he restored the property to its owner, but keeping the Scout Law he refused the reward. Some time later the owner stopped Reg Marsh in the street to thank him for the Scout's action, saying she had not thought much of the movement before, but would not say or think anything to their detriment in future.

In April 1915, First Letchworth suffered a casualty. Local poultry keepers were contributing eggs to help wounded soldiers, and the Scouts made regular collections. Four of them were at the Scoutsmaster' lodgings in Ridge Road one Saturday afternoon, and while he was out of the room they noticed a revolver on the mantelpiece. Robert Copping picked it up out of curiosity, and it went off, injuring Arthur Van Hooydonk, the twelve year old son of a local factory owner. Dr Wilson and Dr De Ledward were called, and Arthur was taken to the temporary hospital in Pixmore Avenue, and then to Addenbrooke's in Cambridge where an x-ray showed the bullet just touching his spine. He was soon out of danger and was home again in two weeks


Our judge for the day Jen Leathers had to make a difficult choice between these appetizing dishes. Judging included marks




