

## **CENSUS**

This year's Census figures are most disappointing. The substantial gains of last year have been wiped out and we have the lowest number of members for many years. The immediate cause of the loss was the failure of three Scout Troops to reopen after Christmas. It is not that the youngsters do not want Scouting but we have not got the leaders. It is here that we have the most serious problem. A glance at last year's figures shows that we have fewer uniformed leaders but more helpers. (1999 Leaders 77 Helpers 18) This seems to represent a trend towards people being unwilling to accept the full responsibilities of leadership.

THIS IS A SITUATION THAT WE MUST REDRESS AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. The District Executive has set up a working party, Allan Patterson, Ron Smith, Peter Dixon-Payne and Joan Huggins, to which it will invite uniformed members. The aim of the working party is to provide advice and help to Groups with the recruitment of leaders.

There is plenty of information available through the Scout Association to help with recruitment so the aim of the working party will be to ensure that Groups know about it and how to use it effectively in the recruitment process.

PLEASE MAKE THIS A PRIORITY FOR THE COMING YEAR.

This applies to all Groups. We must work as a District and help one another to find new Leaders.

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
One of the main issues arising out of the Programme Review at our meetings was that of uniform.

The Scout Association assures us that a review is taking place through Focus Groups working in 24 Districts throughout the UK.

The principles that underlie the uniform consultation are:

- \* That the uniform should represent value for money but the range should be versatile enough to ensure that it is within the financial means of all.
- \* That there should be flexibility, to allow Groups in very different areas of the UK to select a uniform that meets the requirements of their situation
- \* The uniform should give the movement a 'fresh new feel and look' a uniform for the new century.
- \* It should be suitable for the range of climates experienced in the UK
- \* A uniform appropriate to the activities we provide in Scouting it should be suitable to be worn at Scout meetings and a range of outdoor activities
- \* That whilst it should provide a corporate identity across all sections it should distinguish each section by a different colour.

#### A CENTURY OF SCOUTING: PART 3

John Travers Cornwell, a former Boy Scout, was serving on HMS Chester during the naval battle of Jutland in May 1916, in which more than nine thousand British sailors were killed. Himself mortally wounded, 16-year-old Jack Cornwell remained alone at a most exposed post, awaiting orders until the end of the action. He was posthumously awarded the Victoria Cross, and the Chief Scout, Sir Robert Baden-Powell, announced that members of the movement showing exceptional bravery should qualify for the Cornwell Badge, which is still awarded today for Scouts who have undergone great suffering.

On the same page in "The Scout", B-P praised one troop which had been steadily doing good public service during the war years, including Special Police and Fire Brigade duty, Red Cross working parties, and such dull jobs as weekly collection of waster paper and jam jars, and the growing of vegetables for the Fleet. This had been done, the Chief added, by the First Baldock Troop in Hertfordshire!

Much of the Baldock Scouts' enthusiasm was obviously due to their having an inspired Scoutmaster in Cyril Bishop. It may have been his idea, in the year after the war, to raise money for charities (and good publicity for the troop) in a novel way which the local papers called "a rather curious feature" and "most unique". It was a "Penny Trail", first laid along the pavement of White Horse Street on 10 May 1919, carefully guarded by about thirty Boy Scouts who kept the coins "in military alignment" and were afterwards able to send £11/14s. to the YMCA. The stunt was repeated during the next few years, raising funds for St Dunstan's home for blinded soldiers, and for the Baldock Memorial Bed in the new Letchworth Hospital.

Later still, the "Mile of Pennies" idea became popular with many other fund-raising organizations: but it does seem to have been a Baldock invention in the first place!

For their own funds, First Baldock formed a so-called "jazz band" which gave several "electrifying" public performances on the stage of the original Baldock Cinema (next door to the Post Office). Not to be outdone the Second Letchworth (St Michael's) troop included both jazz band and kazoo band items in their entertainment on 16 June 1919, at the Church Rooms in Commerce Avenue (Now the site of the New Look shop). Recitations, songs and sketches were given by Boy Scouts and Wolf Cubs, whose leader, Miss E. Gertrude Allen, pleaded for liberal contributions towards the expenses of the forthcoming camp. Miss Allen had been acting Scoutmaster and Cub master since 1916, when Wolf Cubs were officially recognised by the Boy Scouts Association - though experimental packs had been meeting long before that. Second Letchworth Cubs (under 8 years old) gave a demonstration as part of another concert in November 1919, this time at the Howard Hall, with Mr R, A Beall, the popular Scoutmaster, in charge of the older lads.

First Letchworth troop had been having less success during the latter part of the war, but they had gained strength under a new Scoutmaster, Ralph West, and took part along with Second Letchworth in the Peace Day parade in July 1919, displaying their speciality of bicycles adapted for stretcher bearing. The first outing of the newly reconstructed troop was a week's camp at Swangleys Farm, Knebworth, in August, made more exciting by an invasion of cows who damaged two of the tents.

Meanwhile the older Scouts of Baldock cycled to Saxmundham in Suffolk for a week's camping, rowing and sailing near Thorpeness. Biking home on the Saturday, they were held up by a breakage and a puncture, so they unfolded their blankets and slept peacefully by the roadside till dawn, when

temporary repairs were made. After breakfast between Bury St Edmunds and Newmarket, they cycled in heat and a head wind to reach Baldock by teatime on Sunday.

An excellent tea was laid on for the Baldock troop at the beginning of September, before another of their famous jazz band concerts in the Town Hall. A framed photograph of the Scouts in camp was presented to Mr G. E. Page, in thanks for his generous help with equipment and the use of a camping ground at his farm in Willian. Other local people were pleased to help the Boy Scouts in various ways, and the Baldock troop was delighted with the gift of a large hen house complete with seven live fowls, from Major Donnelly. There seems to be no record of whether this new patrol joined the boys in camp, or if so, in what condition.

## **Adventurous Activities**

Following two serious accidents the Scout Association has been reviewing its policy on adventurous activities. The following extract from a letter which I have received from John Bevan (Chairman, Committee of the Council) outlines the main concerns in relation to mountain activities.

A cavalier attitude to rules by leaders and others within the Movement.

Poor management of parties, particularly larger parties.

Lack of educational purposes for an expedition.

Routes geared to leader 'wants' rather than young persons' 'needs'.

A culture of always having to climb the highest peak, regardless of party ability.

A poor attitude to risk and risk assessment

Authority overridden by unauthorized leaders

Lack of knowledge of expeditions by DCs.

No uniformity in investigating causes of accidents.

Lack of support and assistance in obtaining authorizations.

Too few nationally qualified assessors and advisers

A1960s/70s attitude to adventure and risk that is not acceptable to society in 2000

The view of the Committee of the Council is that the risk of accidents can be considerably reduced if our rules and good practice are properly complied with.

All these matters are being addressed. In particular the following Rule changes identified in the Chief Scout's letter come into full effect immediately-


POR rule 28.9(a) is amended by the additions of the sentence "Any person appointed by a County /Area Executive as an Assessor may act as an Assessor in any other County/Area unless that County/Area has specifically objected to that individual".

POR rule 40(1)(f) is amended by the deletion of the sentence "No more than two parties should move together in the hills", and the insertion instead of the sentences "Every party must include at least one named and designated party leader, and no party may exceed a maximum of seven in all. If a Troop, Unit etc. has more than seven in the area parties must move either on different routes or, if on the same route, with a clear time and geographical separation between them in order that they do not become mixed."

In this connection it should be noted that a properly authorized person (i.e. one authorized to supervise - see POR Rules 37.1(c) and 40.1(b) may still, as at present, delegate the responsibility for leading an individual party to a suitable person, who may (e.g. on a Queen's Scouts expedition) be a young person.
