
BBC ONE: TV Opportunity for Scouts




On Sunday we had a short Cubs Own at which each Pack presented a short prayer that they had written.

A CENTURY OF SCOUTING: PART 4

With the Great War over at last, Baden - Powell's ideal of "Peace Scouting" took new directions. A great rally of all nations took place in the Olympia exhibition hall in London and was named the "Jamboree" by B.-P.. It was here that he was proclaimed as Chief Scout of the World.

And now the separate parts of local Scouting began to take a shape that we might recognize. Throughout the 1920's, Baldock remained as part of Royston District, with Captain J.V. Jacklin as their first District Commissioner, along with patrols and small troops that seemed to meet from time to time in Bygrave, Clothall, Radwell, Stotfold and Weston. Letchworth (and Stevenage) formed part of the Hitchin District, but Letchworth and Baldock quite naturally shared a united open-air service in Howard Park in August 1923.

In that same year, and possibly earlier, a new but short-lived Wolf Cub pack was formed at St Joseph's College in Baldock, with the Reverend Mother as Cubmaster. The pack's registration number was 4716, but more information would be very welcome - especially any photographs of the Reverend Akela in action!

Summer camp for First Letchworth Boy Scouts in 1922 was for the first week of August at Sacombe Park near Hertford. In June 1923, ASM Hugh Gentle cycled to Watford with three of the Scouts to attend Hertfordshire's annual County Rally. Next month, Mr and Mrs F.J. Cole came to the regular meeting at the Boys' Club to present a troop flag, which was ceremonially received by Patrol Leader P. Heele, the first lad who had qualified for the All-Round Cords, then the highest proficiency award for a Boy Scout.

The flag was no doubt proudly carried at the Hitchin District Rally held at Whitney Wood in Stevenage on Saturday 9 July, when Hugh Gentle and Scoutmaster Ralph West gave displays of boxing and singlestick fencing. Fitness and exercise were also major features of the camp at Walton on the Naze at the end of the month.

In January 1924, First Letchworth troop was officially registered at Imperial Headquarters as number 5428, with Hugh Smith coming in as Assistant Scoutmaster. Another job was now lined up for Hugh Gentle, as Cubmaster of the Wolf Cub pack which began meeting on Tuesdays behind the Phoenix Motor Works canteen in Pixmore Avenue. By Christmas, there were 32 Cubs in the pack, aged from 10 to 12 years.

Letchworth's Scouts were among the 60,000 forming a "posse of welcome" at the rally for the Prince of Wales (later to be King Edward VIII) at Alexandra Palace in north London, on 7 October 1922.

Despite all this news and more in the local papers, someone wrote to "The Citizen" in January 1923, complaining that the Boys Scouts seemed "to rather effectually hide themselves". Were they shy of showing their knees in public? This was disproved a week or two later by a grand Scout concert given in the Co-op Hall (above the large shop in Eastcheap which is now called What Everyone Wants!) A new hut, no longer required by the Women's Co-operative Guild, became Letchworth Scout Headquarters in May that year; and it's a nice coincidence that 31 years later, another grand Scout concert was held in that same Co-op Hall above the shop, with the title "Our Show", which after two years became the Gang Show, for Letchworth and Baldock united.

MORE...

Back in the early twenties, however, First Baldock troop, now registered at IHQ as number 1527, had its "club room" (listed in the Baldock Almanack for 1920) in the former Salvation Army barracks, until moving to a larger ex-Army hut at the corner of Pest House Lane (later Clothall Road) in May 1923. Soon after this, twelve of the Baldock Scouts who had reached the great age of 16 formed a Rover Patrol, following the ideals of B.-P.'s new book published in 1922, "Rovering to Success".

Though the book had a high Victorian moral tone with chapters on the dangers of Horses, Wine, Women, Cuckoos and Irreligion, Rover Scouting was "the Brotherhood of the Open Air" where Scout training for citizeship could be continued with a wider outlook suitable for young men wishing to carry into adult life the activities and comradeship they had enjoyed as Boy Scouts.

B.-P.'s first plan was for Rover Troops with Patrol Leaders and Scoutmasters, but soon the "troop" was replaced by a "Crew" under a Rover Scout Leader and assistant Rover Mates. For the first twenty years, Rover patrols were about all that existed locally. First Letchworth had such a patrol from 1924, helping to run the younger troop's camp at Old Warden at Easter 1925, and in 1926 putting on another Co-op Hall concert along with some of the Hitchin Rovers. By 1939, First Baldock and Fourth Baldock (St Paul's) both included a few Rover Scouts, and the Rover Den behind the Manor House was the meeting place for the Eagles and Peewits of Baldock during the second world war. "It is not possible to run Rovers efficiently without a Den", as B.-P. wrote in his book. One year after the war, the first District Rover Crew was formed in 1946 for Letchworth and Baldock.

However, we are getting ahead of the mainstream story. Back in 1925, First Baldock Boy Scouts' activities were getting a little stale, for there was a call for the troop to be revived "with more enterprising methods". declared a new Scoutmaster, J.A. Clarke, supported by ASM Phil Lee. Mr Newling was added to the team as gym instructor, and by next year there were "signs of activity again". A long meeting was held on St Patrick's Day 1926 "to consider developments". Mr W. Pluver took over as Scoutmaster (though this name could possibly be a misreading, as a Mrs Guiver is recorded as a new leader for the Wolf Cubs). Mrs Guiver swept in with the organizing of a whist drive on 26 April which rasied £3/10/4 for the pack funds, already boosted by a succesful Scout dance at the Town Hall.

Wolf Cubs and Boy Scouts were, however, quite separate organizations. Only in 1928 did Imperial Headquarters decide that packs and troops should be united in Scout Groups. This meant a nationwide re-registration which took months to do, and next year First Baldock group received the number 18. In later years this low number gave the impression that it was one of the oldest groups in the country, but in fact it is probably due to the new numbers being allocated in alphabetical order.

Meanwhile, that new Garden City down the road was still growing. First Letchworth SM Ralph West took the troop to summer camp at Conwy in 1925, and was planning the next year's trip to Devon, when a new Second Letchworth troop was starting up. Ralph had 35 Scouts, meeting regularly once again in the Boys' Club building in Broadway, and they were happy to share some activities with the Second. Yes, there was another joint concert in the good old Co-op Hall in May 1928, raising funds for the two troops' joint camp at Torquay in August.

Then, being one of these new Scout Groups in 1928, the Second formed its own Wolf Cub pack at Pixmore School. Things were booming again, and by the end of the decade the Third and Fourth Letchworth Groups were up and running.

This Third Letchworth (registration number 9544) also met at Pixmore School, and continued up to and through World War 2. Successive Scoutmasters are mentioned in directories as C. Thompson, J Armtiage, M.F. Tabor and Ernest Noble. In 1940 they opened their meetings to their brother Scouts in the First who had been deprived of their own headquaters, and in 1941 both troops were sharing St George's hall in Common View with Sixth Letchworth until the war was over.

In March 1941, the Third changed their Scout uniform from navy shorts and grey shirts, to avoid confusion with the newly formed Air Scout branch. They continued in the more usual khaki until the group closed in 1947.

February 1928 saw the first activity in the old army huts which were the church rooms in Baldock Road and Pixmore Way. Announced initially as the First William (St Paul's) group, they had decided to be the Fourth Letchworth by the time of their first camp in May, in the grounds of William Rectory. The Scoutmaster, Sidney Francis Lee, was assisted by William Joseph Underwood; but by the time IHQ registered the group as number 12035 in November 1930, Mr Underwood was the Scoutmaster and also held the entirely new post of Group Scoutmaster.

Garden City 15 Mile Charity Walk - Sunday 14th May 2000




In Memory of Ken Hart



That's an old tradition from the 1960s: too little rehearsal, some forgotten lines, clumsy chorus movement, missed cues for lights and music, might have led to despair. But the magical spirit of Gang Show won through. With hard work and determination the Saturday afternoon performance was twenty

times better, and by the evening it all worked splendidly, bringing loud and well deserved applause from a near-capacity audience. Nothing went seriously wrong, although we had the revival of the forty year old tradition of the long silent gap between scenes. Even these were used to create a new star in the furniture shifter who won the hearts of the entire audience.

By tradition, we shouldn't name individuals in the Gang, but Adam Robson's hilarious recitation of his own parade of puns (while slowly vanishing under an avalanche of football scarves) was something rather special. Robin Hood's Merry Men In Tights, reappearing later as clumping great Little Swans in tutus, were the stuff of a tradition that should never die. Thank goodness for Venture Scouts who are still prepared to do this sort of thing, and to be happily upstaged by a certain ASL's glittering entrance in "Hello Dolly". This was in the even older outrageous tradition of the British Hall where Ralph Reader found the roots of all Gang Shows ever after.

Nevertheless, it is always the stars of the future who steal the show, including the tiniest Brownies hurrying to keep step with their long legged brothers and sisters. And there were real stars in the youngsters performing "5,6,7,8" with vigour and verve that had one old reviewer quite breathless with admiration

We may have been spoilt by the continual brilliance of the Gang Show in Harpenden or St Albans, which are in another league altogether, but in the end we saw that the great tradition is still alive and well in Letchworth and Baldock.

It is the policy of The Scout Association to safeguard the welfare of all Members by protecting them from physical, sexual and emotional harm.

Accordingly, The Scout Association is committed to:

- * taking into account in all its consideration and activities the interests and well-being of young people:
- * respecting the rights, wishes and feelings of the young people with whom it is working;
- * taking all reasonable practicable steps to protect them from physical, sexual and emotional abuse: and
- * promoting the welfare of young people and their protection within a relationship of trust.

Rule 2b.2

It is the responsibility of all adults to ensure that:

- * their behaviour is appropriate at all times;
- * they observe the rules established for the safety and security of young people;

- * they follow the procedures following suspicion, disclosure or allegation of child abuse;
- * they recognize the position of trust in which they have been placed; and
- * in every respect, the relationships they form with the young people under their care are appropriate.

NOTE: the guidelines Young People First set out a code of behaviour which is essential for all adults in Scouting to follow. The guidelines are available from the Scout Information Centre.

In the meantime at Norton Bury Beavers will be taking part in the Crystal Maze.


In the evening the Cubs will go to the Letchworth Leisure Centre for a swim party and there will be a camp fire for the Scouts and Guides.


