The team was chosen from the Cubs who attended the two trials in April. The first of which was held in the pouring rain. The second after Easter when the weather was a lot better.


I would like to thank all the Cubs and their parents for coming along and making it very difficult to choose only eight Cubs from the large number that turned up.

It was with anticipation that I opened my newspapers the next day - but guess what - the front pages had been reserved for anti capitalists whose "peaceful" demonstration had brought injury, damage and havoc to the centre of London.

MORE...

A CENTURY OF SCOUTING: PART 6

Although still part of Hitchin District, Letchworth Local Association was able to hold its own AGM in November 1938, attended by the District Commissioner, the Garden City's very own "Uncle" Ralph West. The Chairman, Howard Hurst, was unable to be there himself, but there was great applause for him when it was announced that he had generously given £100 to clear the debt on the Headquarters Building Fund. This still left £46 in hand towards future repairs and renewals - although the general account now only had a balance of 4s 9d compared with £4, a year before. Numbers of Scouts and Cubs however, had risen from 147 to 203 and continued to expand. Seventh Letchworth had just started, and the Fourth has a new Rover crew and Scout troop at St Paul's. First Letchworth and Third Letchworth Boy Scouts and Wolf Cubs were separately using the fine new headquarters on different nights of the week, as they would continue to do, more or less, for the next 28 years!

Leader problems naturally became more acute as men and women were called to national service, full or part-time. Hertfordshire being a reception area for London evacuees, there was even more need for Scouting and Guiding programme to help them. At the start of the war, the Guide County Commissioner and Scout ACC (the Hon. Mrs Geoffrey Gibbs and Commander P.W. Kent, RN) wrote to all the local newspapers, promising all the help that the movements could give. "Weekly meetings mat have to be held either in the morning, afternoon or evening, according to local conditions. We shall accept any offers of help with the greatest gratitude believing, as we do, that the lode of the children must go on as normally as possible during this period of upheaval and strain."

One of the first major upheavals was the cancellation of the annual County parade for St George's Day at St Albans Cathedral. In April 1940 (and ever since!) it was up to districts to make their own arrangements. For the first time, Scouts and Cubs from Letchworth, Baldock and Ashwell paraded together from the Howard Hall and marched behind the Letchworth Town Band through Leys Avenue and over the bridge to Bedford Road, for their service at St Thomas a Becket, conducted by the Vicar of Norton. The DC, Ralph West, took the salute and the parade dismissed at the Icknield Way headquarters.

That was the last time. During that summer of the Battle of Britain, Letchworth's headquarters building was requisitioned for use by the Army. The separate First and Third Letchworth Wolf Cub Packs then met together on Saturday afternoons in Pixmore School, while their two Boy Scout troops were asked to report on Tuesday evenings at St Paul's Church Rooms - (where the Fourth met on Saturdays) - until "an adult person can be found to replace Scoutmasters who have been called up for military service", and they too could transfer to Pixmore School.

Reporting to the Local Association AGM in November 1940, the secretary, A.M. Raven, referred to the good work being done - especially by Cubs in collecting waster paper, which often entailed long distances with a loaded trek cart. Some Scouts repeated the service given by their fathers in the first war, assisting the Home Guard by acting as messengers.

Large numbers of evacuees had come from Bexhill in East Sussex, and some of these now formed the new Second Letchworth Wolf Cubs who met in the Free Church Hall on Wednesday afternoons at 4.30 in order to finish before the evening blackout. Two Bexhill teachers, Miss I. Cummings and Miss I. Cheater, both with Guiding experience, met the challenge of running the pack through that winter, until in 1941 the new Second Letchworth Group was registered at Imperial Headquarters as number 22352, and there arrived from Houghton in Huntingdonshire one of our most remarkable Scoutmasters. Miss Beatrix Gore-Harvey was disabled and in a wheelchair, but very capable of running an active troop programme - and before long, the new Cub pack as well!

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From her old Scout group at Houghton, Miss Harvey brought the distinctive scarf, halved scarlet and royal blue, which became the Second Letchworth's colours for over thirty years. Though meeting in St George's hall, the group's registered title was "(St Nicholas')" as this was then the parish church of Norton, sponsoring group.

But it was at St Paul's Church, Willian, that 350 Scouts and Guides of Letchworth and Baldock paraded in the snow in Sunday 19 January 1941, for their memorial service for the Founder, Chief Scout of the World, Lord Baden-Powell of Gilwell, who had died at his home in Kenya, aged 83. The service was jointly conducted by the Rector of Baldock and the priest in charge of St Paul's, the Rev. R.W. Martin, who said in his address: "Never give up. Make your troop loved and respected by everybody. Don't let it stop growing. Don't rest on your laurels; never be satisfied. Bring more and more into your troop and by your own example make them into good Scouts and Guides."

Despite all the difficulties of wartime, Scouting had its successes locally. In March 1941, Jack Collins, Fourth Letchworth Troop Leader, at 175 looking forward to joining the Royal Air Force, had qualified with enough proficiency badges (including Ambulanceman and Civil Defence) to earn the King's Scout badge. The 1941 St George's Day parade and service was held (probably for the first time in Britain) at a Salvation Army Citadel - in Norton Way North, and this included the presentation of colours to the Second Letchworth (or Bexhill) Wolf Cubs. At St Mary's church, First Baldock made an archway of patrol flags for the wedding on 7 June of Miss Florence Head and their Scoutmaster, Harold Pitcher. Later in June, older boys from First, Third and Sixth Letchworth, (then meeting jointly at St George's) had a weekend camp at Codicote, experimenting in camouflaging tents and cooking under food rationing restrictions, enabling Scouters in charge to gain ideas for the possibility of running larger camps again. Gordon Taylor, Group Scoutmaster at Fourth Letchworth, died in July 1942, aged only 30, but the life of the group went on under the guidance of Jim Northover as Scoutmaster who himself became GSL, Rover Scout Leader, and District Scoutmaster, when the war was over. New plans from IHO included the introduction of Air Scouts, and in January 1943 the Fourth formed one Air Scout Patrol which continued for a few years, with no equal throughout the

Then in May 1944 came two important changes. Sir Percy Everett, Deputy Chief Scout, and from the very beginning County Commissioner of Herefordshire and Middlesex, resigned from his County posts, owing to increasing work during the serious illness of the new Chief Scout, Lord Somers. And at our own local level, Letchworth and Baldock were at last united as one District in their own right. The newly appointed County Commissioner, Graham Wallis, came to meet a large assembly of Boy Scouts in the great meadow at Norton on 17 June 1944, and while pleased that numbers in the movement were increasing, said something very familiar - that there was a shortage of leaders, many of whom had inadequate time, and were trying to do three or four jobs at once. The CC inspected the troops present (First Ashwell, First Baldock, Second, Fourth and Seventh Letchworth and the still combined First-Third-Sixth) and congratulated the District Chairman, Mr Alfred Thomas Hodgson, who had introduced him to the boys. Before the year was out, Ralph West had resigned after many years of outstanding service, and Mr Hodgson was the first District Commissioner for Letchworth & Baldock District Scouts.
