Lost in the Jungle

A dramatic rescue was launched when a party of Scouts lost their bearings in the jungle.

Joel Miller of the 4th Letchworth Scouts and Richard Moys from 2nd Weston Scouts were part of a team of eight Scouts aged between 10 and 16 who embarked on a five day hike in their first week of Expedition DODO.

The group, carrying equipment in backpacks, penetrated the jungle alone and slept in tents when darkness fell. Their progress was monitored by leaders who supplied them with fresh water every morning.

The Scouts were given maps and compasses to negotiate their way through the Black River Gorge but the wild vegetation made navigation difficult. Richard explained "We crossed the river to find a path leading up into the mountains but we could not find it on the other side. We had to turn off, right up into the trees and mountains. At one stage it was very dangerous because if one of us had slipped we would have fallen halfway down the mountain and died.

"During the scramble the person in front dislodged a large rock. As it hurtled down the mountain it hit the leader - who had joined us that day - on the back of the head."

Joel continued "It was getting dark so we had to camp overnight but some of the tents were damaged by the undergrowth. We didn't have any water so we had to set up drip pans to collect water and luckily we had a downpour."

Scout leaders, who were concerned when the team of Scouts did not arrive at the rendezvous point, launched a search party by helicopter.

Richard said "A helicopter spotted us and dropped off a man by the side of the road. He asked us some questions and told us they had been looking for us. When we arrived at the town we found police cars and army jeeps waiting to take us back to base camp.

### A CENTURY OF SCOUTING : PART 9

Letchworth & Baldock District was becoming better known throughout the Scout County in the late fifties of this century. After two successive wins by our Scouter teams in the annual "County Marathon" hiking competition, Hertfordshire decided to close the adults' section of that contest. Taking up an idea floated by Melville Balsillie, ACC for Senior Scouts, our District Rover Crew in 1958 organised the "Tour of Hertfordshire" cycle time trial for the 15-18 age group, and it continued successfully without injury for the next five years. The County champion in this event in 1961 was John Butcher of the Third Letchworth Senior troop, completing the 100 mile circuit in just over six hours.

Max Vines, Rover Scout Leader of the District crew, and Roland Millbank, leader of the resurgent Fourth Letchworth Rovers, represented the County in organising a joint camp with Bedfordshire, held near Luton in March 1962. Together with Rover Scout Michael Blaxland, Max was part of the very first working party camping, clearing scrub, and drinking water straight from the burn, at another of Mr Balsillie's enterprises - the conversion of the derelict railway station at Lochearnhead in Perthshire.

1961 was a historical year in other ways. The District gained no fewer than five new Queen's Scout - Michael Dilley, who almost at once became Scoutmaster of Second Baldock troop; John Davies, who found, when camping at Aberdeen with First Baldock Senior Scouts, a gigantic vertebra washed up on the beach - which he cleaned and converted into the "Whalebone Trophy" for some eccentric competitions like Operation Tarzan and Kon-Tiki for years to come; John Butcher and Roger Wood, in Third Letchworth, and Robin Edmett in the Fourth. Also that year, Letchworth Council invited the Scout District to reenact the "show camp" on Norton Common which had been part of the Festival of Britain ten years earlier, and it was such a success that the event was repeated several times in the following decade, keeping the movement well in the public eye.

When Leslie Pears retired in 1962, Melville Balsillie became County Commissioner, and his dream was realised when the Chief Scout, Sir Charles Maclean, officially opened Lochearnhead Scout Station. As a regular reader of "Co-ordinator", the CC next year persuaded its voluntary typist to act as editor of the new County bulletin, "Hertfordshire Scout News". (There had been previous short-lived versions in 1936 and 1945). This compliment to Letchworth & Baldock District was repeated in 2000 when the present producer of "Co-ordinator" was also appointed to the chair of what has since become "Hertfordshire Scouts & Guides", and history happily repeats itself.

As "Co-ordinator" passed its fifth anniversary, negotiations were going on with Headquarters (no longer "Imperial") about the possibility of the District Badge Shop also acting as an agent for Scout Shop equipment, books and uniforms. Several years passed before Eric Oldham, chairman of the badge subcommittee, was able to undertake mail-order sales of such items, until in February 1968 the first District Scout Shop opened for direct business in the old Civic Civil Defence building in Gernon Road. By that time, great changes had taken place in Scouting, both locally and nationwide.

The biggest revolution came in 1966 with the Chief Scout's Advance Party Report, which effectively abolished Wolf Cubs, Boy Scouts, Senior Scouts and Rover Scouts.

These were replaced by Cub Scouts, Scouts, and the new conecpt for young adults, Venture Scouts. Mushroom coloured trousers finally ousted the familiar khaki shorts, to the dismay of traditionalists who prophesied Scouting's doom. But locally it had never been more popular, as the census that year reached the record figure of 698 for Letchworth & Baldock. The boundaries of course included Ashwell and Weston, each group flourishing under Group Scoutmasters Albert Bush and John Watts. Both gentlemen were transformed by the Advance Party Report into Group Scout Leaders, just as every Scoutmaster was from then on a Scout Leader, except in the columns of the popular press who have still not quite got used to the change after 34 years.

After 8.5 years, we had to become accustomed to the absence of Leslie Brown as District Commissioner. Retiring to keep a fatherly eye on Ashwell from his new bungalow, he was succeeded by Harold Hodge, who was previously secretary to Plymouth Scout District and had become a popular figure locally as a backstage worker at the Gang Show and helper at all kinds of events from Cub parties to wild Senior Scout night exercises.

Regrettably, after only a year, Mr Hodge's work moved him away from the District, together with his wife Eileen who had settled in ideally as Akela of Ninth Letchworth Cubs. With Anthony Larenee as a new troop's Scoutmaster, then Scout Leader like the rest, the Catholic group had bright prospects. When successor leaders were needed, Mrs Mary Hawley appeared for the Cub pack and John Ferguson for the Scouts, but as it has happened so often the candle of the Ninth flickered and went out at the end of 1968.

Sixth Letchworth, the Salvation Army's own troop, burst into life once more in 1966, but despite all efforts by Stewart Skinns and his Assisant Leaders, this group also closed, probably for the last time, in March 1969. This was only a month after the ending-up of another sponsored group, Third Baldock, at the Methodist Church. The ADC (Cubs), Hannah Shannon, by then Mrs Moules, inaugurated this new Cub pack in March 1965, and Mrs Olive Goddard boldly took on the job of Akela. Soon a keen new Scout troop was formed, guided by Peter Moules until the arrival of Graham Mulchinock as SL; but again the group was too small to survive for long.

Minimum sizes for groups to be viable were a major concern of that Advance Party Report. This suggested that some smaller groups would do well to merge and so provide more lively programmes for their members. Thinking ahead, two of the Letchworth groups were quick off the mark. Having for years met on separate evenings in District Headquarters, the First and the Third troops, and the First and the Third packs, all agreed to do the honourable thing, and were reborn as First-Third Letchworth. The new dark green uniform Scout shirts and Cub jerseys prompted a dramatic change of neckerchiefs from the green and yellow of Third and the dark green of First. For maximum visibility, new scarlet scarves bordered with white were just right.

In a message to the new group, the County Commissioner congratulated them on their prompt decision. "We in Hertfordshire have long been urging the amalgamation of smaller groups in which boys can be trained in much more efficient and adventurous ways. Our target would be a Cub pack of 36 and a Scout troop of 48. I am delighted that Letchworth is taking the lead, and I wish your new Group every success."

Questions of size had been troubling our Senior troops for some years before the Report. District events for that age group could attract dozens of participants, making planning freer and activities more exciting on a big scale. Such were the peculiar Whalebone Trophy events, such as living 24 hours up a tree, or/a raft - or in the case of Operation Pheidippides. In October 1965, this was a

mad marathon race across the District from Ashwell to Willian using bikes, roller skates, prams and wheelbarrows, by seven teams, First Baldock's Chris Anderson and Robert Wilsher being the popular winners. All competitors, from whichever troop, knew each other as belonging to the same organisations—the same District—and this was part of the thinking behind the various Senior Scout Leaders' plan to form a Senior Scout Federation, rather than a District Troop. They had not enough time to see if it would work, for a few months later the large Unit of Venture Scouts was national and County policy.

With thirteen Senior Scouts metamorphosed into Venture Scouts, Fifth Letchworth won a dispensation to try working independently, but were proved wrong. The few who stayed on were accepted in the large and successful unit led by Brian Watkins, taking its name from an old local guide book: Champion Hills.

4.30 pm till 6.00 pm Beavers and Cubs (Brownies as well)


6.00 pm till 7.30 pm Scouts, Ventures and Leaders (Guides and Rangers as well)
