

NORTON BURY—THE WAY AHEAD

We have entered into discussions with Letchworth Garden City Heritage Foundation about the future of Norton Bury. Many of us have an emotional attachment to Norton Bury in view of the hard work that we have put into its development over the last twenty years and the many exciting events that we have held there. Thousands of children have benefited from its facilities.

However, we must face the reality that the Manor House is an old property and in a poor state of repair. It is likely that in the near future repairs to the roof and sewage system will cost in excess of £50,000 and there may well be other problems with the building itself. This is a heavy burden to place on future generations of Leaders and it is a problem which is recognised by the Heritage Foundation.

The Foundation is anxious to continue it's support for Scouting and Guiding and also given the responsibility it has to get best value from the properties it owns, believes that a fresh start is the best way forward. It is offering us land in a conservation area that is being developed between Willian and Wymondley. This area is a key community resource linked to the 18 km Greenway which will encircle the Garden City, providing a unique facility for walking, cycling and horse riding. There is a camping area of approximately 2.5 acres in addition to the 3 acres which have been developed for conservation. There is also access to woodland and a pond. The Heritage Foundation is willing to provide a log cabin style building to accommodate thirty children and leaders together with appropriate activity space. It will be designed to fit in with the ethos of a conservation area and have environmentally friendly features such as solar heating.

The advantage of this project is that it would provide us with a new building that will be virtually maintenance free for many years to come and there will be the challenge and freedom to develop the site in an imaginative way to meet the future needs of Scouting and Guiding. We can transfer the assault course to the new site and there is space for a climbing wall and other facilities.

Representatives of the Scout and Guide Districts and the Norton Bury Management Committee have been in consultation with the Heritage Foundation. There will be an open evening at The Guide H.Q. Icknield Way on Wednesday 28th March - 8.30 pm - 10.00 pm when you can view and discuss the proposals.

When we first heard about the challenge, we thought it would be fun. So we sent off for the details. It wasn't always easy for the Beavers or the Leaders, especially when we asked them to write about the events. It was too much like school. So we decided that they could make their diary by drawing pictures and just writing little sentences next to or under them. We actually managed to get a very interesting diary together with writing, drawings and photos.

We decided that for the caring part we would collect pennies and send them to a local charity. We managed to collect 2348 pennies (£23.48) and we sent it to the Keech Cottage Childrens' Hospital in Luton. We also wanted to collect 2000 stamps for Charity. When we found out that Blue Peter had a stamp appeal, we decided to send ours there. We have in fact collected many more than the original aim of 2000.

We counted 2000 steps while we walked from Norton Bury to Radwell. In the Scout HQ, to keep warm as we had no heating at the time, we skipped together 2000 skips and threw the balls up 2000 times and in the same evening we had 2000 seconds peace while all the Beavers were lying still. Unbelievable they actually managed that very well! We also did 2000 obstacles on the Assault Course at Norton Bury and went sledging at Bassingbourn on the dry ski slope.

At Easter we made rice crispy cakes and Easter cards. We also had a theme of Pirates and made hats, eye patches and we took a photo of all the Beavers and put them in a pirate ship. They also learned to write messages with different flag signs.

For the spiritual development we went to Church on Remembrance Sunday and the Christingle Service. We also joined another colony for a game called throwball at Norton Bury and have joined the District on different events. All in all, we had a fantastic 2000 minutes challenge and I am sure the Beavers will be very proud when they receive their badge and certificate from Maureen Shattock ACC (Beavers)

A lesson from K .J. Lechwerth Scout District

Noticing that some members of the District still have difficulties with the name of Hertfordshire's Scouts' activity centres outside the County, I offer the following notes which may be some help to anyone interested.

1. "The Station"



The river collecting several streams from the Braes of Balquhidder and flowing east to the Firth of Tay is named <u>EARN</u> (like the word meaning to acquire money honestly). Where it widens into a large lake (<u>or loch</u>), it gives its name to <u>LOCH EARN</u>. At the top end, or <u>head</u> of the lake, the village is therefore, known as Loch Earn Head, but these four-letter words are written as one, LOCHEARN-HEAD, and pronounced with equal stress on each syllable. We should avoid saying the first two syllables as "Lochan", because <u>lochan</u> is a very small lake, quite unlike the large Loch Earn.

2. "The Mill"



Here again we have some trouble with a four-letter word! The first part of the name of **Coetmor** Mill is related to the Welsh word <u>Coed</u>, meaning a wood. "**Mor**" in Celtic languages means "large", usually spelt "**Mawr**" in Welsh. The odd thing is that an m following a d in Welsh usually gets mutated to an f (and pronounced v!). So that if the Mill's name originally meant the Large Wood, you would expect it to be **Coedfawr**. Probably Anglo-Saxon influence seems to have changed the name to **Coetmor**. The first syllable, however, is pronounced like "quoit" in the game of quoits, and not like overcoats or dovecotes.

If these notes are any help, I shall be very pleased, as I can imagine how we would feel if ignorant folk from other parts of the kingdom always got the name of our town wrong.

New Scout Uniform

New Uniforms for the UK's half a million Scouts were revealed on 22/02/2001 on Founder's day, the 144th anniversary of Baden-Powell's birth.

The uniform will be introduced gradually over the next two years to become fully effective from January 2003. This is the first major change in almost 34 years.

The aim has been to produce simple, stylish, and yet affordable garments across all the age groups. Within the range there are also various options for polo shirts, activity shorts, outer jackets, fleeces and a baseball cap.

Items will be branded using the new Scout logo discreetly incorporated into the various garments and accessories.

The decision to reassess Scout uniforms after 34 years came as part of a wide-ranging review covering everything from activities that young people enjoy at their weekly meetings to age ranges and the image of Scouting. A new logo was introduced in January 2001 and delivery of the complete package of changes, including a new youth programme covering the age range 6 to 25 years, will be complete by 2003.

Free Criminal record Checks

The Scout Association welcomes the Government announcement that checks from the Criminal Records Bureau will be free for voluntary youth organisations. The checks will identify if adults volunteering to work closely with young people have a criminal conviction.

Chief Executive Derek Twine said "Not only has a potentially damaging financial burden been lifted from the voluntary sector but this will also encourage organisations who do not currently check applications to do so. This is a significant step forward for any organisation committed to keeping the young people in its care safe from harm".

The Chief Executive also expressed this thanks to Members of the Scout Movement throughout the UK who had joined with other concerned local voluntary organisations to brief their MPs about the damaging impact the charges would have had. This would have been particularly the case in areas of social deprivation and economic hardship.

This year's census figures make pleasing reading as they record an increase in Scouts which offsets the disappointing figures of last year. I would like to thank all Leaders who have worked so hard build to up numbers during the year. It is important that our movement reaches as many youngsters as possible and we must always keep recruitment at the forefront of our thoughts.

Pleasing as the figures are we must not lose sight of the downward long term trend in the District. During my period as District Commissioner the highest total was 669. This means that there has been an annual average decline of one percent in our numbers. Although this is better than the national average we should not be complacent and I feel there is sufficient demand in our District for Scouting for us to easily reverse the trend. If each training section in each Group aims to increase its membership by just two Scouts we would be back on course.

Next year's review will be written by a new District Commissioner and what a start it would be if this target was achieved.
