John Chapman - John has changed his role to oversee International Scouting in recognition of his world wide travels. Don't be surprise to get a phone call from Iran one evening.


Gareth Howell - Gareth was Scout Leader at the 11th Letchworth. He has a passion for the mountains and has taken part in a number of mountain leadership courses.

Gilwell Reunion

PRI - Programme Review Implementation

Members of the District Team and GSLs from Letchworth and Baldock and Hitchin joined forces to hear Anne Barnes (Deputy County Commissioner and County Change Agent) talk about the changes being introduced to the structure of Scouting.

implementation

programme review Her talk concentrated on the Explorer Scout section and the Scout Network. This is the area where Scouting is currently finding most difficulty and failing to retain membership.

Her theme was flexibility - that Scouting must be presented to these age groups in a way which will allow them to experience many Scouting activities without necessarily tying them down to the present pattern of regular weekly meetings.

Large Groups may have sufficient Scouts to organise their own Explorer Scouts but it is likely that groups will form for specialist activities such as mountaineering or water activities or to participate in the Gang Show. There is also provision for a new role of Young Leader.

The Explorer Scouts will be organised at District level and two new appointments have been introduced - the Explorer Scout Commissioner and the Explorer Scout administrator.

The Scout Network will develop along similar lines but will be organised at County Level.

The District Team has started to plan how this might operate in our District and leaders are welcome to join the debate by contacting Dave or Chris.

Please do not try to resist the change or alter things to suit your own needs. The debate is over and a new model has been set up to deliver Scouting to the older age groups. It is important that we all move forward together to deliver a quality programme.

Thank you Anne for an interesting talk which clearly outlined the way ahead and for the interesting and thought provoking discussion which followed.

This month I thought it would be good to look at the new uniform.

There are key elements and optional elements to the new uniform for all sections.

The key elements are a sweatshirt, trousers and neckerchief for the Beavers and Cubs; and a shirt, trousers and neckerchief for Scouts, Explorers, Scout Network and Adults.



The optional elements are a polo shirt and baseball cap for all sections; and a sweatshirt for Scouts, Explorers, Scout Network and Adults.

Trousers are primarily combat/cargo style in Navy Blue. However from Scouts upwards there is the option to wear smart navy blue trousers, or a skirt (if female!)

You will probably have discovered the new colours by now but here is a reminder:-

Beavers - Turquoise Cubs - Dark green
Scouts - Teal Green Explorers - Beige
Scout Network & Adults - Stone

Badges are to be placed on the sweatshirt/shirt in the same positions as now, apart from the Group nametape, District & County badges on the right sleeve which should be placed below the embroidered Scout Association logo. Badges should not be placed on the polo shirt.

It is probably a good idea within your Group or Section to decide whether you are going to wear the baseball cap and then let the child/parents know before they go to buy their uniform.

We will have to enjoy the new multi-coloured look to our meetings, so please remember the most important point is that changing to the new uniform is not meant to be a radical change that happens overnight – there is a two year change-over period – we have until 31st December 2003 to changeover to the new look.

BADGES



As part of the Scout Association's Programme Review most current badge designs have been reviewed. The outcome of this exercise is the redesign of current badges. The Group, District, World Badges and Group name tapes are not affected.

The new designs will be launched at a series of Regional Launches of the new Programme, in February 2002.



To control the process initially stock may only be issued upon receipt of the new Outdoors Badge Order Form which will be made available to County/Area Commissioner at the Regional Launches.

They will then be given to the District Commissioners who will pass on the forms to the Badge Secretaries so that stock can be ordered.

There will be sufficient time to obtain stocks of new badges before the Groups begin to operate the new programme.



Current badges will be available until the end of 2003.

Wearing of Badges

On the new uniform the District, County and Group sash must be positioned under the embossed Scout Logo on the right sleeve.

National occasional badges can be worn as directed and for such periods as decided by Headquarters (usually twelve months)

Group, District and County occasional badges in connection with special gatherings, events or anniversaries must be approved by the County Commissioner and must not be worn after a period of three months from the date of the conclusion of the occasion unless exceptionally authorised by the County Commissioner in respect of special circumstances for a further period not exceeding nine months.

I would respectfully ask all Leaders to ensure that all members of their Group follow the above advice taken from POR (Policy Rules and Organisation).

IT'S HISTORY IN THE MAKING AS ENGLISH HERITAGE SPONSORS SCOUT HERITAGE BADGE

Copies of a 'step-by-step' guide for Leaders on helping Scouts to gain the Badge has been sent to Groups.

It includes information on how to arrange free visits to sites of historic interest for your Scout Troop and also how Scouts who complete the Badge can get free family days out.

Study categories include helping to preserve an aspect of local or national heritage, becoming involved in a traditional entertainment group or studying an aspect of history.

The English Heritage offers free visits for Scout Groups at its 409 historic properties and has also made available the expertise of its nine regional education officers to help inspire and smooth the way for Leaders. And every Scout achieving the Badge will receive a free family day out to an English Heritage property of their choice.

We are the dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders' fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe; To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders' field.

And now the torch and poppy red Wear in honour of our dead.




