But she happily went home still bandaged... but then perhaps the last lot did it so well it wouldn't come off... I'm not sure. I ended up in the kitchen with severe arm burns. Still got them on whilst I'm typing this... shall I leave them to show off at work tomorrow or wash them off? The make up I got this lunchtime was fun. Applied a wound to each of my Scouts whilst I talked about water, and cling film and keeping burns away from dirt to avoid infections. Gary my Red Cross man gave us all his advice and circulated around the bases. Mike Miles was involved in a car accident. Severe injuries he had. But all we could really do was make sure the scene of the accident was safe. He'd be alright.

Did they learn anything? Maybe. Let's hope we never have to find out.

X is for the xylophones played by Filipino strolling minstrels, who end their seasonal performance by singing Maligayang Paski (Merry Christmas) to the tune of Happy Birthday

U is for the USA, where, in remote parts of the south, firearms are shot to greet distant neighbours on Christmas Day

Y is for the Yule Cat, the terrible beast rumoured to eat all those poor Icelanders who do not receive a new piece of clothing as a Christmas present.

Criminal Records Bureau (CRB)

The Criminal Records Bureau has now informed the Association that the system will go live for Scouting to use on 1 April 2002.

The additional CRB check will enhance rather than replace the Association's existing confidential enquiry (CE) checks that are currently undertaken.

All applications for CRB checking will be done through the Records Department at Gilwell Park. Counties, Areas and Districts should not register with the CRB.

The CRB process requires that the applicant's identity is confirmed by seeing and checking certain items of identification e.g. a passport or photocard style driving licence and two documents which confirm the address of the applicant e.g. utility bills. Original documents, not photocopies, will need to be checked.

Ideally, the checking of these items should be seen and confirmed by someone at the District level e.g. the District Secretary or the Secretary of the District Appointments sub-committee. Similar arrangements will be needed for County/Area appointments.

Annual Census 2002


Attention all Group Secretaries
