

# The Chief Scout - George Purdy CBE to open Wymondley Wood Scout and Guide Centre



We have received the keys to Wymondley Wood and to cap the good news the Chief Scout, George Purdy will be visiting us on Saturday 24 May to officially open the Centre. It is a tremendous honour to host the Chief Scout and it will make our Centenary Jamboree a memorable event.

The Centre has been completed on time and our thanks go to Morris Builders and Len, their site agent, Steve Rogers (architect) and Marilyn Hands (Director of Property at Letchworth Garden City Heritage Foundation).

All the new furniture will be delivered to the Centre during the next couple of weeks. Work parties have been busy tidying up Norton Bury and will be transferring equipment to Wymondley Wood.

All will be ready for the first occupants, 1st 3rd Letchworth and

12th Letchworth Beavers on 15 March.

The biggest problem has been the wet weather which has hindered the landscaping of the site and may limit outside use for a time but a spell of dry weather should quickly sort this out.

Meanwhile plans are going ahead for the Centenary Jamboree and the official opening. In view of the Chief Scout's visit it has been agreed to keep all activities on site on the Saturday so that as many Scouts and Leaders can meet him as possible. There will be a wide range of bases to cater for all ages ranging from crystal maze activities to an aerial runway and a climbing wall.

It is an important event in the Heritage Foundation's Centaury celebrations and local TV cameras will be there.

I was selected to attend the Jamboree more than a year before the event. In this time I managed to get quite a lot of fund raising done. The days until we departed barely seemed to change until it got to about a month and from then the time flew.

On the morning of the 23 December 2002 I got up at about 4.30 am; this was because we had to be at the meeting point in Cuffley by 6.00 am. We were waved off by our families and sent on our way with warm wishes from the County Guide and Scout Commissioners. We knew a long time in advance that the travelling was going to be murder. Forty five minutes in a car, one hour thirty minutes in a coach, fourteen hours on first flight, three and a half hours on the second flight and finally four hours on a coach. That's close enough to a whole day travelling and that doesn't even include sitting in departure lounges for three hours before each flight!

Anyway, once in Thailand we were taken to a very posh hotel not far from Bangkok. Here we spent Christmas Day by the pool and meeting new people. In the evening of Christmas Day, all 2,400 British Scouts were transported in a fleet of taxis, with a police escort to a big hotel where there was Christmas dinner with crackers. The following day, amid tight security we were again whisked of in a fleet of coaches for a sightseeing tour of Bangkok.

On the 27 December we made the short trip to the Jamboree site. Being taken out of an air-conditioned hotel, sitting in an air-conditioned bus only to be dumped in a sandy, baron landscape with an air temperature of about 45 degrees centigrade isn't a nice experience and it was made even worse when we had to carry our suitcases and rucksacks the thirty minute trek to our site. But no sooner had we got there than we were all acclimatised and raring to go. (hmm I think not). As there were over 30,000 people at the Jamboree, (more than the population of Letchworth) you need a site nearly the size of Letchworth to accommodate them. This was done by converting an old US Navy base into a camping site, with its own railway and specially built reservoir.

Most of the free time during the Jamboree was spent swapping things, such as badges and neckerchiefs. I managed to swap my whole uniform for an American one, which had a good story behind it as it was the only America uniform from Hawaii. I also managed to swap a Japanese unofficial uniform and dozens and dozens of badges. I got the opportunity to try food from most countries in the world, and I tried one dish, which sticks in my head as it put our beloved British Vindaloo to shame!

At the Jamboree itself we did many activities which I have never done before and will probably never have the chance to do again, such as running a car from peanut oil, swimming through a snake trap (not done purposely) and trekking through the jungle. We celebrated New Year with about 150 different nationalities and finished up by getting up at 7.00 am the next morning to celebrate New Year at home by jumping in the sea with dozens of other British Scouts!

One of the most exciting activities was a day we spent off site at a local school. It was a school which hadn't much money and was in need of some new facilities, so we went along to help build a new volley ball court. It was very hard work, but you could see the excitement in the children's eyes when we finished it.

All these activities and events made the Jamboree exactly what I had expected it to be, but once the Jamboree was over, we still had places to go and new people to meet. Our original plan was to go to the Philippines to stay in Scout family homes, but due to the threat of more terrorist attacks we were taken to Singapore instead and put up in an air-conditioned hotel; we all remembered to stick our little finger out when we drank tea, so I think we did the British Scouts proud!

This wasn't the first time the threat of terrorists was upon us, as about a week before we were due to leave Britian the Foreign Office weren't happy with the situation in and around Thailand. However, the Thai Army and Navy were brought in to protect the site and they even went as far as to have battleships moored just off the beach to protect us.

We spent our time in Singapore mostly shopping and visiting places of interest. This was a great way to round off what was a truly once in a life time experience, a three week period of my life which I can say I was an ambassador for the British people.
