Three Peaks Challenge

Two members of the District have recently completed the Yorkshire Dales Three Peaks Challenge.

Tony Hartley, ASL 4th Letchworth, accompanied by his son, Joe (16) Oak Eagle ESU, and Tony's two brothers Andrew and Graham completed the 24 mile trek on Saturday 19 April 2008, taking in the three peaks of Pen-y-ghent, Whernside and Ingleborough. The 12 hour walk is officially described as a severe test of endurance and stamina.

The Hartley brothers, Tony (42), Andrew (39) and Graham (36) first started to plan the expedition a year ago and commenced regular training. Joe was enlisted as chief of training and pace-maker. Since then Tony has lost two stones, Andrew five stones and Graham one stone. The four completed the challenge in 9 hours and 59 minutes, over two hours inside the regulation time. They are now all members of the elite Three Peaks of Yorkshire Club.

Tony said, "My brother Andrew came up with this hair brained scheme. At first I wasn't too sure but once I started to see the benefits of losing weight and getting fit I was really into it. I thought this could be a good fund raiser for the group. I have to say that I found it much more testing than I had expected but I am now so glad we did it. We raised £450.00 for 4th Letchworth (St Paul's) Scout Group who need to replace some of their camping equipment."

Wymondley Wood Scout and Guide Centre Report 2007 – 2008

The highlight of the year was the District Scout Centenary Jamboree when over four hundred Scouts and Leaders joined in activities both on and off the site and enjoyed a giant street party

Biggleswade District Scouts also celebrated the Centenary with a

big camp at the Centre.

Both events required a great deal of planning but proved just how many youngsters we can accommodate at the Centre when a event is well organised.

As usual the Centre was well used throughout the year. The indoor accommodation is particularly attractive to Brownies, Cubs, Rainbow and Beavers and there are very few free dates.

We continue to enjoy the support of other organisations. Each year the number of Schools using the centre increases and it is particularly good to see it being used regularly by Woolgrove School and Valley School from Stevenage. St John Ambulance, the Sea Cadets and the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme are also regular visitors.

We were pleased to host a girls rugby team from Canada and Australian Guiders. A number of outside Groups have also hired the Centre for day activities such as training courses and lunches.

Outside a Chess Square has been added to acknowledge the 30th Anniversary of the local Scout Fellowship

It has been a difficult year with regard to public utilities. For a large part of the time we were in dispute with Eon over the size of our electricity bill. They had not read the meter for three years and were reluctant to accept our belief that the meter was faulty. A lightening strike in August which knocked out the whole system including the meter and transformer eventually got negotiations going towards a satisfactory settlement.

We have had no such luck with the water supply which has been reduced to a trickle. Negotiations with the Water Company and numerous experts and consultants have not come up with an explanation of the problem nor, more importantly from out point of view, have they proposed a solution. *

In the meantime we are very grateful to the users of the Centre who have coped with the problem very efficiently and cheerfully. Also thanks to the Wardens who have done their part towards easing the problem.

The Centre has now been operating for five years so we have set about a major re-decoration in order that we can maintain its high standards.

We welcomed Rita Hawkins to the management committee as representative of the Scout District Executive as a replacement for Alan Wright who remains a co-opted member. We were also pleased to co-opt David Daws.

We were sorry to lose Ann Martin who resigned from the Committee and also as a cleaner. We thank Ann for her services over many years.

I would like to thank all members of the Management Committee who work so hard to ensure the smooth running and maintenance of the Centre and, in turn, we are grateful to all wardens for their help in maintaining the quality of the Centre and the welcome they give to our visitors.



Ann Nally - 1st Ashwell Scout Group

Your District may be interested to know that I have been trying to trace **Ann Nally** in the USA only to find that she died on 12 June 2007. When Ann was Cub Leader of the First Ashwell Pack in 1961 the DC of Letchworth & Baldock, Leslie Brown persuaded her to go to Gilwell for her Wood Badge training. When she left the UK for Texas and then the Philippines, she became involved in Cubbing and when her husband Jim was stationed at the Pentagon, she started her Scouting in the US again. In those days only Den Mothers and Den Leader coaches could be female, Cub Leaders had to be male. The "GSL" of the Group realised he had a good find and registered his assistant as M.A.Nally and it was years before the Area Council found out she was not a man. By this time Ann had organised Wood Badge Training in her area and in a few years 90% of the Area leaders were trained, more than anywhere in the USA! When rules were relaxed and females were given more training opportunities, Ann was made District Cub Training Chairman and later Council (County) Cub Training Chairman. For her work Ann received the Silver Fawn and later following her work on the Regional Training Committee the Silver Antelope. She was author of the official history of Cub Scouting and became a member of the National International Committee attending many US and World Jamborees. It is reputed that she always returned to the UK each year to attend the Gilwell Reunion. In 1982 Ann was awarded the Silver Buffalo the highest possible award in the USA, this is roughly equivalent to the Silver Wolf in the UK but is given to far fewer people, on average 12 each year. The year Ann was presented, Ronald Regan got his. When she contracted Parkinsons, Ann continued to work on her history projects and Cubbing until she had to go into assisted living for the last seven years of her life.
