

Evaluation of Public Footpaths Expedition Challenge - 2nd Baldock Scouts

The Greenway

Overall the Greenway is a great footpath in great condition. Most of it is well signposted and not misleading and is a lovely walk as well. Unlike a lot of footpaths this has very few road crossings and all have pelican crossings nearby. The route that we walked on the Greenway had no stiles at all, so is push and wheelchair friendly. The only negative comments we have to say about it is, on a roundabout near the Jackmans Estate there were two very misleading signposts. As we came out onto the street we saw a signpost saying to go straight ahead and across the roundabout, but we distinctly remember going right on this section. Then we saw a signpost saying to go right on the opposite side to where the other sign said to cross. So, actually we would be going parallel to the way we thought we were going. Confused? That's the point I'm trying to make, it doesn't make sense. Overall 8/10

The Kingfisher Way

This can hardly be called a public footpath, though we only walked a small way we weren't impressed at all. The first part of it that we walked on was OK. It was a nice little walkway alongside a river, then we got to the bad bit. As we exited this walkway we were put straight onto a very busy dual-carriageway and no signpost to tell us where to go. Luckily one of our team remembered from walking it before and showed us the way. For about 100vds we were walking alongside the busy road. In some places where the plants had overgrown we were almost on the busy road facing the oncoming traffic at 60 or 70mph. When we got to the crossing it took 10mins to find a safe place to cross, and even then we were cutting it fine. As we walked through it was like a jungle, nettles a few feet taller than me leaning towards us from both sides as we walked down a narrow footpath. Sharp and tall thistles also lean out and as the person in front of you shields them self from it, you get hit in the face. Low branches from trees overhang so you have to duck. You have to step over tree logs that are unstable right in the middle of the path. Finally, at the end there was a bridge with two wooden poles at each end that we had to step over. The path was a shambles! Surprisingly enough, we didn't think this was push or wheelchair friendly because the path was too narrow and the person in the chair would get stung by the nettles, and the logs and trees would make the person fall out. Overall 1/10.

As part of their community challenge 11th and 12th Letchworth Scouts recently visited The Cloisters in Barrington Road, Letchworth. For those that don't know that's the strange looking building with the towers and turrets next to St Christopher's school.

Twenty Scouts and their Leaders were met at Cloisters by Jim and Janet Smith who were kindly hosting the visit.

The visit started with a presentation by Jim who explained all about the building which is now 101 years old and its founder the eccentric Miss Annie Lawrence.

He explained all about its history from its original use as a centre to teach teachers with visitors living and sleeping in open air dormitories and growing their own food.

Sleeping outdoors was very popular at this time. Apparently Baden Powell slept on his balcony nearly every night for 20 years.

He told us how the people of Letchworth used to visit on Sunday afternoons and for a shilling (5 pence) could listen to concerts and swim in the pool. Miss Lawrence taught many Letchworth children to swim in the pool and when they had learnt presented them with a special bluebird fountain pen.

During World War 2 the building was used by the army and Air Raid Wardens had a lookout post on the roof to observe German bombers.

After the war the building was taken over by the Freemasons who use it to this day.

We then toured the building with Jim using old photographs to show how it had changed over the years. He also pointed out the strange architecture which is not just in the shape of the building but also in the detail such as the lead work which has a re-occurring bat motif as Miss Lawrence was fond of bats. One of the most striking features is the marble fountain inside the front door which used to dispense all the drinking and washing water.

The Scouts were particularly interested in the 'wall of discovery'. This is an apparently normal wall on the outside of the building inset with flint stones. When you stare at it you can see the



shapes of animals such as dogs, fish and elephants in the stones. The longer you stare at it the more you see.

We were also allowed into the Masonic Temple which used to be the outside of the building but is now the inside. Jim also explained about Masons and their charitable work.

After a question and answer session the Scouts were allowed to let off steam in the woods at the back of the building.

Thanks to Jim and Janet Smith for looking after us and doing such a good job in keeping 25 lively Scouts in order.

all an enjoyable day






