




## LETCHWORTH AND BALDOCK DISTRICT SCOUTS

November 2008



Since 1922, there has been an Honour Guard of Queen's Scouts (and formerly King's Scouts) flanking the door from the Foreign & Commonwealth Office to the Cenotaph. There are no remaining written records in The Scout Association archives to tell us precisely the history of the first Honour Guard, but it is probable that the King's Scouts were there at the request of King George V himself.

Remembrance Sunday for Scouts isn't about marching like soldiers or glorifying war. It's about representing fellow Scouts who 'did their best' in frightening and dangerous circumstances for the sake of their community and their country. Last year, one lonely placard, waving above the heads of the crowd, read 'The Young Are Grateful'.

#### Scouts at war

By the end of the World War 2 more than 60,000 Scouts had been awarded the National Service Badge for their work at home. They had worked as First Aid orderlies, signallers, telephonists, Air Raid Precaution (ARP) messengers, stretcher-bearers, Coast Watch, Home Guard instructors and Rest Centre assistants. They had made camouflage nets, helped evacuate thousands of younger children from bombed city centres, harvested millions of tonnes of food and animal fodder, chopped wood on a massive scale (around 600,000 hours) and salvaged glass, metal and rubber for re-use.

However, it was the service performed by Scouts during the air raids and the Blitz on London that showed outstanding courage and application of the words of the Scout Promise and Law. Eighty young Scouts were given Scouting gallantry medals, and in London, Coventry and Liverpool the Silver Cross (Scouting) was awarded to entire Troops. Individual Scouts were awarded the George Medal and George Cross. Fifteen Scouts just old enough to serve in the forces were awarded the Victoria Cross. One particular service Scouts gave to London was quiding fire engines in from the outskirts to the city by the quickest routes to blazing buildings.

When they couldn't get any closer to the fires because of the danger, the Scouts provided First Aid treatment and a barricade to stop others getting

too close.

Here in Letchworth and Baldock Scouts guarded the reservoir at Weston during the First World War. In the Second World War they acted as messengers and the Scout HQ in Icknield Way was taken over by the military.

## Beaver Visit to Letchworth Library 8th Letchworth


I've recently visited 10 Packs and Troops selling Gang Show and hope to have lots of new faces again this year.

The Show is on March 20 and 21 2009, please put it in your diary.



## Duxford District Cub Scouts Day Out

On Sunday 12 October 2008 I went with over 200 Cubs to Duxford Imperial War Museum. We went in a minibus which Akela drove and it took about half an hour to get there. We were all given a sheet when we got onto the minibus. There were questions to be answered on our visit about what type of aeroplanes and aircraft registration codes we would see at Duxford.

When we got there, first of all we went into Air Space. There were lots of planes in Air Space including the famous Concord which we were able to go into and have a look around. It was really good inside Concord and when we got out we stood underneath the tail of Concord which is really huge. Also in Air Space there was a Lancaster plane and a Rolls Royce engine that powered Spitfires, Hurricanes and Supermarine Spitfires during the war.

On the second floor of Air Space there is a Funzone. There is a hub there that has a wind funnel and a wooden plane. The wind funnel blows wind at the wooden plane and we were able to move a lever which controls the rudders on the plane. This can make the plane face up, down, left, right and even diagonally.



We then went to a hangar, where there are a lot of planes being repaired. These include a B-17 Flying Fortress plane called the Memphis Belle (pronounced Bell). This is a really famous plane that has had a film made about it.

We then stopped for lunch which we ate outside on the grass by the Hillside Hangar as it was a very sunny day.

We next went to the American Air Force Hangar. This is built into the side of a hill. It is very clever because when you enter the hangar you enter the side of the hill. In the American Air Force hangar there is a Lockhead Blackbird fighter jet

and the apparently larger version of the B2-Bomber jet. Outside there were two planes which we were allowed to go into, a B.O.A.C. plane and a Trident Two plane. Inside these planes the smell was so bad that it made you feel queasy. There were five planes in total outside, two British Airways planes, one at the front and one at the back of the row of planes. There was also a Monarch plane and the B.O.A.C plane and the Trident Two plane.

In total we saw about fifteen planes take off or land from the runway there.

Our last visit was to the Land War section. There was a man who told us about life in the Army. There were also lots of tanks, trucks and cannons. There were mannequins of soldiers in the Army to make it look more realistic.

We had a great day which was really fun but after the wartime experience it was time to go home.


