# Astronomical Evening 8th Letchworth Beaver Scouts

The 8<sup>th</sup> Letchworth Beavers had a very interesting evening in January. They were lucky to have a visit from Jerry Stone of the Letchworth and District Astronomical Society.

He started his talk by asking the Beavers what they knew about the term Astronomy. Then he talked about what stars and planets actually are.

He showed them a scaled down model of planet Earth and where, in relation to it, the Moon actually is. They are approximately 242,000 miles apart.

He explained that when we see the stars, it is the glow of their gases that we actually see. Planets do not glow. The only way we can see them is when the sun reflects off them.

They learnt how a telescope works. The first telescope was used by Galileo 400 years ago in 1609.

It was then time to learn about all the different plants in the solar system.

Mercury, Venus, Earth, Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus, Neptune, Pluto (which is now known as a dwarf planet) and some new dwarf planets, Ceres, Haumea Makemake, and Eris.

Jerry had some inflatable lifelike scale models of the original nine planets for the Beavers to see and put in the right order from the Sun. They needed a bit of help but got there in the end! In March we are going to visit the LDAS observatory at Standalone Farm. Hopefully we will be able to see Venus and maybe even Saturn.

It was a most enjoyable and informative evening and we are all looking forward to the next instalment.

We thoroughly recommend this talk to all groups. Jerry can adjust his talk to cater for all age groups. Due to grant funding the LDAS are able to offer 2 nights for the price of 1 - £50 for a visit to you and then for you to visit the observatory.





### So what's it all about?

Patrols may consist of Scouts, Guides or a combination of both. Teams of Explorer Scouts and Guide Senior Section may take part, but may not win the Main trophy.

**Skills?** You will need to be able to read a map and follow instructions. A working knowledge of basic Scouting / Guiding skills is very useful!
