The Movement keeps on growing - Thanks to all our Adults

We have now completed one of the most difficult and time consuming activities on the Scouting calendar, the Census. Ron Smith, our District Appointments Secretary, has been burning the midnight oil to collate all the returns from our Groups for submission to County within the timescales set. This, having been completed, I can now report that we have had an absolutely stunning total for this District. Two years ago as we started the Centenary year our total membership was 623, after the publicity we received during 2007 our membership in 2008 ballooned to a total of 699. This year, still building on the higher profile of Scouting both locally and nationally, we have recorded a total District membership of 788!. This gives an overall increase in membership of nearly 13%. We have been fortunate enough to have gained a healthy number of new Leaders in the last 12 months and this fact, as we always say, is one of the big contributing issues to growing the movement. We have also re-launched two Sections, 5th Letchworth Beavers and 11th Letchworth Scouts during this year, the benefits of which I hope we will see as the year progresses. If only we could generate new Leaders as easy as we can recruit the Young People who knows how many members we could have.

From myself and the District Executive I would like to say a huge thank you to all of you, our Leaders, Young Leaders, Sectional Assistants, Executive Members and Parents for giving so freely of your time, showing such selfless dedication and commitment to the movement and providing our 700+ Young People with an exciting mix of learning, fun and adventure.

Without you all, there would not be a Scout movement.

788 members – can we top 800 next year? – who knows – lets give it our best effort!

"When he was faced by a difficulty or danger, however great it appeared, even in the shape of a dragon - he did not avoid it or fear it but went at it with all the power he could ... That is exactly the way a Scout should face a difficulty or danger no matter how great or how terrifying it may appear. He should go at it boldly and confidently, using every power that he can to try and overcome it, and the probability is that he will succeed. "St. George's Day is April 23, and on that day, Scouts remind themselves of their Promise and Scout Law. Not that a Scout ever forgets either but, on St. George's Day, he makes a special point of thinking about them."


