 - * Note: As per POR weather conditions must take precedence over formality of dress
 - * Individual Section Leaders to confirm locally with their own Groups nearer the date
- Scouts will parade to Baldock Catholic Church where a service will take place
- The Service will be of Christian theme led by Father Denis expected to start to 3pm
 - * There will no parking at the Catholic Church, except for disabled parking

 - * Note all cars must be parked by 2.10pm, due to road closures
 - * A collection will be taken for Feed Up Warm Up during the service.

Girlguiding MONOPOLY RUN

I took part in this year's London Monopoly run with other scouts in 2^{nd} Baldock and we came 1^{st} in our league and 79^{th} out of over 1,000 teams. This is what we did:

Firstly, what is the London Monopoly Run? Well, it is an event that takes place every year (in London of course!) and Scout groups across the UK take part. The task is pretty much how normal monopoly would work but you use a mobile app. You need to go around London, trying to buy 'properties' which would be landmarks around the city. However, you need to be the first group there in order to buy it because, if another group buys it before you, you will need to pay rent for it. Don't try dodging the ones that are already bought because if you don't pay rent for it by the time the day ends, you will have to pay 1.5x more than what the rent was worth! Along the way, there will be random challenges that you can complete for money, and in the end, the group with the most money in their league or out of all the teams wins!

We arrived at the train station at around 7:00 am to leave for 7:30 am. While we were on the train, the 2 teams in 2nd Baldock looked at their routes through London to see what the fastest method was to get through all the properties. When we arrived at London, we went to Jubilee Park which was the starting area and got ready to go to our first location. We visited many popular landmarks such as:

Trafalgar Square (the ice cream statue)

BT tower, Tate Modern, Leicester Square, And man more! In the end, we came at the top of our league and below the top 100 out of every single team, and to finish it off, we got some McDonalds for dinner.

I found the Monopoly Run fun and I will probably do it again next year. I would recommend that you have a shot at it because you get to explore London and visit various landmarks.

The Monopoly Run is a unique Scouting event held in London once a year. Scouts from all over the country take part in it. Some of them come from as far as Scotland! It is not the traditional monopoly board game which you are familiar with. The idea is the same: you

have to claim or buy properties and earn money by collecting rent. The difference is that you have to physically reach those properties, most of which are famous buildings all over London. The event lasts 6 hours so you have to be fit and fast. The teams are in leagues of 7 and the winning team is the one with the most money at the end of the day.

Our team of 5 scouts, a team leader and a parent began our adventure early on Sunday morning by taking the train to London. The event started at Jubilee Gardens and across the Thames. We had 30 minutes to plan our route and then we set off. While many of the locations were in a square mile near the starting point, there were some as far away as Kings Cross. If you wanted to win, you had to visit all locations otherwise you had to pay a penalty of 1.5 times higher rent. So, speed was essential.

We were using an app created especially for the game. It showed us how much of the board we visited and how much we owned, how much money each team in our leagues was on, whether we had any challenges or quizzes to complete. Towards the end of the run, after my team had visited every building, we tried to calculate whether we would win in our league. The app showed us that we had about 30% of the board but we were still \$1000 beneath the top team. However, the app also revealed that they had only paid us in one location meaning that they hadn't visited all the locations. Due to the penalty of 1.5 higher rent for not visiting all locations, we calculated that they would come lower than us. We had visited every location so we wouldn't lose any money.

We eagerly waited for the results. Finally, they arrived. We came first in our league and an impressive 79th out of over 3000 teams! The Monopoly Run was an unforgettable experience allowing us to visit London, get familiar with famous buildings there and gain confidence using trains and buses. We had to use strategy, we had to be fast and we definitely had fun while doing all that. The cherry on the cake was our exceptionally good final result.


Fifth Letchworth Scouts




