




One year on

8th Letchworth Scouts at the County Green Beret Challenge 17 - 19 October 2023









"From first light to 11pm" to achieve the Green Beret Challenge, teams of six Scouts compete in four main elements:

- Orienteering
- An Assault Course
- Day activity bases
- Night activity bases

Green Beret was very cold, and very wet! We could say we definitely battled all elements of weather apart from possibly snow. The walks were long but worth it in the end, we had to complete at least 10 day bases in order not to be disqualified, ranging from seeing how fast you could put marbles in a jar, to tug of war being lucky if you didn't fall over in the mud funny for the others though. And walking on wooden planks as a team. You also had to complete an assault course and, in case you couldn't guess, it was extremely muddy as 1000 scouts had already had their fun on it.
